Preliminary Hearing in the Zoubek Case

Daniels Charged With Murder of James Zoubek, Jr.

From Saturday's Daily

Before a court room thronged with interested spectators, the preliminary hearing was held in the case of the State of Nebraska vs. Everett Daniels, John Daniels, Ival Daniels and William Falk, charged with first degree murder and in which they are charged with the death of James Zoubek, Jr.

The crime of which the four defendants are charged occurred on Lincoln avenue in the south part of the city, the tragedy occurring on the highway between the Zoubek and Daniels' places, on the night of September 5th.

The state called as its first witness. Earl Newton, companion of Zoubek on the night of the crime and whose version of the crime was the basis of the state's case.
