Long Time Resident of Masonic Home Passes On

Chauncy B. Walton, 84, Dies at Home Early Today After Long Period of Ill Health.

From Monday's Daily. This morning at the Nebraska Masonic Home occurred the death of Chauncy B. Walton, the oldest resident of the Home in the point of residence as he had been at the home since February 14, 1918.

Mr. Walton was a familiar figure on the streets of the city and had taken a great interest in the affairs of the community since his residence here. Being an ardent democrat it was one of the greatest pleasures to this fine old gentleman that he was able to live to see the triumph of his party candidate for the presidency at the last election.

Mr. Walton was born in Mercer county, Illinois, January 27, 1849, spending his youth there and in later years locating at Ord, Nebraska, where he became a member of Ord lodge No. 103, A. F. & A. M. While at Ord Mr. Walton was engaged as a salesman for a great many years until his advancing years forced his withdrawal from the work. In the session of the legislature of 1909-1911, he served as the postmaster of the state senate.

He is survived by one daughter, Mrs. Edith Jaeger, North Platte, and one son, Floyd Walton, residing near Chicago.

The funeral services will be in charge of Plattsmouth lodge No. 6, A. F. & A. M. and will be held on Wednesday afternoon at the Horton funeral home.
