Plattsmouth Masons Observe Anniversary

One of Most Notable Events Held Here Marks Founding of Plattsmouth Lodge No. 6.

Plattsmouth Masonry was joined last evening by distinguished members of the order in the eastern section of Nebraska as well as representatives of the neighboring lodges, in the observance of the seventy-fifth anniversary of Masonry here.

It was seventy-five years ago on January 18, 1858, that a group of twelve of the pioneer men of the west gathered at the Toole & Hanna building then located at the foot of Main and Second streets, to hold the first meeting of Plattsmouth Lodge No. 6, A. F. & A. M. In the late summer of 1857, Masons who had migrated here from the east and south had met and started the proposal for a lodge in this community as Omaha, Bellevue and Nebraska City had formed Masonic lodges and they felt the need of the fraternal association.

Last evening at the banquet board the members of Plattsmouth lodge and their guests had the pleasure of hearing a part of the long history of the local lodge, prepared by William A. Robertson, past master of the lodge and grand marshal of the grand lodge. The history was complete in detail and represents a task of labor on the part of the author for his fraternity, as it has taken much of two years to gather the details of the history from many sources.

It was a great picture as the Masons gathered around the handsomely arranged tables in the lodge room in the comfort and pleasure of their friendly association as contrasted with the small group of bearded men that had gathered in the roughly furnished room of a pioneer store to launch the lodge that now ranks as one of the most successful in the state.

The banquet was arranged with a cleverly prepared menu that carried out the pioneer spirit. The banquet itself was prepared by the live and hard working committee of the lodge headed by Carl Schneider, senior warden of the lodge, the serving being by members of the De Molay and sons of Masons. There were one hundred and ninety to participate in the enjoyment of the delicious repast.

The program was presided over by William A. Robertson, who in his clever manner presented the various participants on the program and also gave a short history of the local lodge.

The invocation was offered by Major Hawkins, chaplain of the Seventeenth infantry and stationed at Fort Crook.

The Masonic quartet, composed of Frank A. Cloldt, Raymond C. Cook, H. G. McClusky and R. W. Knorr gave several numbers during the program, a treat that all appreciated, the accompaniment being played by E. H. Wescott.

One of the features of the evening was the formal presentation to the lodge of the handsomely framed pictures of all of the past masters of the lodge from E. A. Donelan, first master to L. F. Terryberry, who has just retired from the office. This collection of pictures represents months of effort to secure the pictures and have them enlarged and made ready to rest on the walls of the lodge room. The pictures were secured through the untiring work of W. A. Robertson, the enlargements made by E. J. Weyrich and W. F. Evers prepared the frames from native Nebraska walnut. The pictures were presented to the lodge by Leslie W. Niel, past master and secretary of the lodge.

Harold Thom, past master of Nebraska lodge No. 1, of Omaha, was present and spoke on behalf of his lodge, which body had recommended the granting of the charter to Plattsmouth lodge in 1858. The speaker expressed the pleasure of his lodge at the splendid organization they had made possible in Plattsmouth.

The certificate of lodge proficiency was presented to Plattsmouth lodge by Lute M. Savage, grand custodian, who paid a fine tribute to the work of the lodge and the high standard that had been maintained.

Raymond C. Cook, deputy grand custodian made the presentation of the individual certificates of proficiency to the officers of the lodge.

Masonry, gave as his remarks, "Masonic Pioneers," sketching the early leaders of Masonry in the territory and state and in which many of the Plattsmouth members had been among the active leaders.

Presentation of past master jewels to L. F. Terryberry and Robert Painter, past masters, was made by Judge A. H. Duxbury, who expressed to the officers the appreciation of the lodge for their fine services in the past.

R. Foster Patterson, in his able and eloquent manner paid a tribute to Plattsmouth lodge No. 6, for the long service it had borne in Masonry and for the untiring spirit and efforts of the members in maintaining it as one of the most efficient lodges of the state.

Archie M. Smith, master of the grand lodge of the Masons of Nebraska, gave a fine address on "The Grand Lodge of Early Days," tracing the history of the grand lodge in the days from the formation of the first small group of lodges down through the civil war days and the opening of the seventies. This address was one that was followed with the greatest of interest and gave many important facts as to early Masonic history in the state.

The program was closed by the benediction by the chaplain, Dr. H. W. McClusky.

The occasion was notable for the fact that for the first time in many years the heads of all the York Rite Masonic bodies were present at a Plattsmouth Masonic gathering. Among the distinguished Masons from out of the city to be present were: Archie M. Smith, Pender, grand master Nebraska A. F. & A. M.; Oliver A. Pick, Omaha, grand high priest Royal Arch Masons; Dr. Carroll D. Evans, Jr., Columbus, grand commander, Knights Templar of Nebraska; Lewis E. Smith, Omaha, grand secretary Nebraska A. F. & A. M.; W. B. Wanner, Falls City, grand patron Eastern Star, and past grand commander; Lute M. Savage, Omaha, grand custodian, A. F. & A. M.; John T. Dysart, Omaha, deputy grand commander; Major Thomas A. Harkins and Captain D. P. Branson, Fort Crook.

There were also large delegations from Weeping Water, Springfield, Nehawka and Elmwood in attendance.

Chamber of Commerce Organizes for Coming Year

President Fred I. Rea Announces Committees of the Directorate to Serve During Year.

President F. I. Rea, the new chief executive of the Plattsmouth Chamber of Commerce, was greeted very enthusiastically by the presence of twenty-eight members at the first 1934 meeting of the directors yesterday.

In his opening remarks to the members, President Rea made a fine statement of the work and possibilities of the local Chamber of Commerce, which was a splendid challenge to the group to exert their best efforts in 1934 for the good of our town and surrounding community. In a very systematic way President Rea covered the possibilities for each committee, and in calling their attention to some possibilities of achievement, he stimulated increased interest and activity in the work of each committee.

President Rea's comments upon the possibilities before each committee served as a challenge to the group and gave them an enthusiastic start, which will no doubt mean another successful year for the Plattsmouth Chamber of Commerce. He pointed to the excellent financial statement of the Chamber in having stayed well below their budget of expenditures for 1933. He expressed appreciation of the spirit of harmony which existed among the members of the directorate, and complimented the Retail Section upon its outstanding achievements for the year.

Following the remarks of President Rea, he called upon the chairman of the committees for 1934, who made brief statements with respect to the plans which they had in mind. The president then announced the membership of the committees for the year. A number of changes were made in the personnel of each in order to make new assignments. The committee which has heretofore been known as the harbor and docks committee was changed to the river improvement committee, in order to make it clearly abreast of the times. The only other change in the committee lineup involved the revival of the Happy Hundred banquets as already mentioned.

Under the leadership which the Plattsmouth Chamber of Commerce has had for a number of years, it has become a most important organization in our community. President F. I. Rea is ably qualified to be the leader of this organization. He has won a reputation for efficiency and executive ability in the field in which he labors, and has with these the esteem and respect of the business and professional men of Plattsmouth and its community. He has served Plattsmouth organizations in other capacities in years passed, and the members of the Chamber of Commerce know that they have in President F. I. Rea an able and splendid leader, who will be of credit to the Plattsmouth Chamber of Commerce, and to Plattsmouth and surrounding community.

Carl Schneider was recently chosen to act as vice-president for a second year. His connection with the Chamber last year and the executive ability he has displayed in his activity in other community organizations has already marked him as one of the ablest young leaders of Plattsmouth. Carl Jensen assumes the duties of treasurer and his past experience as a business executive in his own field of endeavor will insure a splendid execution of the work of this office. E. H. Wescott, who has served for the past three years as secretary will serve in this capacity again. The fact that he has been chosen by three presidents for this post is a tribute to the hard work he has done in keeping the secretarial end of the organization moving and up to date. His preparation of the minutes gives them a life and vigor which makes them interesting to hear. With these officers and the committee members, the Plattsmouth Chamber of commerce looks forward to the work and opportunities of 1934.
