## Tragic Scenes Found as Bodies are Identified

### Eighty Unknown Victims of Vienna Fighting Rest in the Hall of Dead.

Vienna.—In the eerie depths of a hall of dead lay eighty unidentified victims of cracking carbines, throaty howlers and purring machine guns which rumbled thru streets once famous for Danubian waltzes. The government does not know who they are.

Some wear the clothes of the laborer, while others the uniform of the soldier. Still others wear homemade dresses of the housewife. Eighteen of the victims have on school clothes, four of these being girls.

We are standing near the morgue at the Vienna general hospital, where the bodies are awaiting identification. Here come fathers, mothers and sweethearts, hoping, praying and wringing their hands, or just looking dazedly at row upon row of bodies.

The government asked all persons whose relatives and friends are missing to visit the morgue. Outside a queue was forming indicating that hundreds have relatives or friends "missing." The line moved slowly. No one talked.

A couple joins the line. They cling to each other, the nails of her hand biting into his arm. She is dabbing her eyes and saying something hard to understand. It sounded like "Lieber Gott, lieber Gott, bitte nicht das." (Dear God, dear God, not that). Bringing his huge hand to his eyes, the man staggers slightly and

then moves slowly toward the door. Others join the line. A huge form bustles up, asks a few questions cautiously, and then gives a plaintive little cry. The form moves slowly to the foot of the line.

Another couple entered the door. A fatigued interne guided them gently. They hurry toward the little bodies in the corner.

A look, a gasp, and the mother collapses.

Only three girls remain now to be identified.

### CHARGE ROADHOUSE OWNER

Falls City, Neb.—County Attorney Falloon Friday charged Marguerite Banker with operating a place of amusement without a license, as the result of a spectacular raid on the Maple club roadhouse near here by about a dozen officers.

Approximately ninety persons were seized in the raid Sunday morning. Falloon said that under the statutes, each day the place operated constitutes a separate offense and as a result he filed eighteen separate counts against her as proprietor of the club.

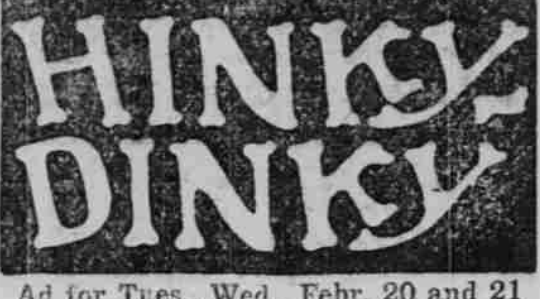

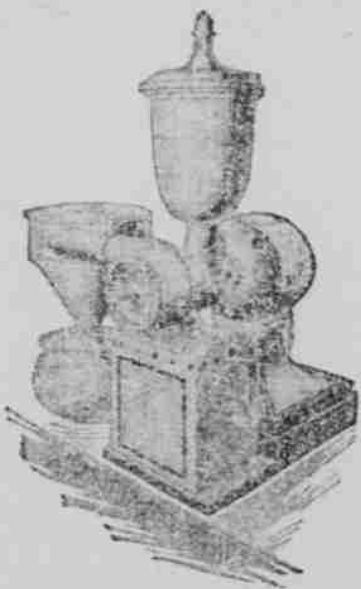

## Relief to Those in Need of Help to be Continued

### Lopping Off of Civil Works Employment to Be Gradual Says Hopkins.

Washington—Industrial cities will retain their full quota of civil works employees until late in March, but elsewhere the disbanding will move forward, with 400,000 workers to be dropped in rural areas next week. In outlining this course, Harry L. Hopkins, civil works administrator, said that while there might be variations to meet local conditions, the demobilization would proceed at the rate of about 10 percent a week. He added that rural areas would be first disbanded because the great majority of such workers were farmers or farm workers who would find work at their regular occupations as the weather improved.

Hopkins said the effect would be to make the heaviest demobilization in the south. The new regulations prepared for the next ten weeks provide:

First, in dropping civil works employees, all persons living in a household where another member is working, whether on public or private employment, will be dismissed first.

Second, all persons who have other resources will be dropped.

Third, the agency will be maintained at full strength in all industrial cities through the present winter.

"The rate of decrease will be adjusted to weather conditions," Hopkins said. "The decrease will be accelerated with the beginning of spring and the demobilization will be completed the week ending May 1. The new wage regulations will read substantially as follows:

"Effective not later than March 1 the wages paid on WA work shall be a minimum of thirty cents an hour and the prevailing rate of wage in each local community for the kind of work performed. The hours of work for the present will remain at twenty-four hours a week in the cities and fifteen hours in the rural areas. Any city which is authorized for any reason to add workers will add only workers that are in need. It is our intention to develop on a substantial scale certain projects. One of these projects is the rebuilding of new consolidated rural schools in those states that have a consolidated school system. Other similar major projects are under consideration which can be completed by May 1."

Determination to carry out the demobilization by May 1 was shown at the white house, but President Roosevelt indicated that it was too early yet to decide upon what plan would be used for next winter. Hopkins said the determination of a long range plan to care for situations such as arose during the depression was in the hands of the president. Hopkins said that all who needed relief after civil works ended would be given it. The president continues confident that the great number of the 4 million now on the civil works payroll will be absorbed by a pickup in industry and agriculture and the public works program by summer time.
