Prince Sigvard's Romance Causes Worry in Sweden

Believed Line of Succession May Be Seriously Impaired—Nation Cherishes Traditions.

Stockholm.—With another prince determined to desert tradition and marry outside the royal circle, all Sweden wonders what will be the future of the royal family.

At the rate at which beautiful commoners are ensnaring the hearts of Swedish princes, the line of succession may be seriously impaired, persons close to the crown believe.

The sentiment of the public at large is against unauthorized runaway marriages, and the plans of Prince Sigvard to wed Erika Patzek, a German film actress, do not meet general approval.

In short, Sweden wants its royalty democratic, but not too democratic.

A Desire for Freedom. The action of Prince Sigvard is taken here as further indication of the desire of young Swedish royalty for complete personal freedom, regardless of the wishes of the people or the rest of the royal family.

Prince Lenhart, now plain "Mr. Bernadotte," gave Sweden its first shock two years ago by openly proclaiming his intention of marrying when and whom he chose. He kept his word, despite criticism, taking as his wife Karin Nissavand, daughter of a Stockholm industrialist.

The fact Sweden cherishes the royal family and its traditions, and is unwilling to dispense with the crown under any condition, makes the action of Prince Sigvard particularly disturbing.

Balk at a "Mister" for a Prince. Swedes don't mind referring to King Gustav as "Mr." the name he uses in tennis tournaments, but when obliged to speak of a prince as "mister," it is another matter entirely.

Last year, the Socialist leader of parliament, helping to vote down a motion to make Sweden a republic, said royalty gives "a touch of mystery and poetry to life and to people" but Sweden as a whole sees no particular mystery or poetry in runaway marriages, to say nothing of the loss of pomp and ceremony.

It was reported here that Prince Sigvard was working on a scenario for a new picture, and that he also was considering a Hollywood contract.

Asked recently concerning this, he said: "Do you think I intend to work for German film companies all my life?"

FREED OF SLAYING, WIFE GETS INSURANCE Lincoln, Feb. 22.—Marjorie E. Moore, who was acquitted of the slaying of her husband, Guy, at Arapahoe in 1932, was awarded double indemnity on his insurance in a suit against the Equitable Life Assurance society, Wednesday by a jury in District Judge Broady's court. The verdict gives Mrs. Moore \$2,000 plus \$200 interest.

METEOR'S FALL WRECKS HOME OF VILLAGER

Seviglia, Spain, Feb. 25.—Francisco Megia told his own story Thursday of the destruction of his home by what he and all his neighbors at the village of Rincónada believe to have been a meteor's fall.

Megia and his family sat down in their home for lunch between noon and 1 p. m. Sunday.

Suddenly there was the noise as of an airplane flying low over the cottage.

Jose Megia, 13, rushed to the door. He saw a dense column of smoke dropping from the sky toward the roof.

Panic-stricken, he shouted his alarm. Megia tried to run to the door, but a powerful column of air and smoke knocked him down. Megia and his family said they smelled a heavy odor of sulphur and burned coal.

The whole family rushed outdoors, carrying only the mattress from a bed.

As they attempted to return to the house for more belongings, they were stopped by a short, deafening noise, and their cottage was immediately enveloped in flames.

Farmers in the neighborhood heard the noise and hastened to the aid of the family.

Depression is Ended, Declares Charles Dawes

Upturn Which Started Last October to Continue—Hails President Roosevelt.

Chicago, Ill., Feb. 21.—Charles G. Dawes broke a two-year silence about business conditions today to declare that the depression had ended.

Prosperity began returning last October, he said. For the future, he predicted "continued better conditions in business and industry."

The former republican vice-president made his optimistic prediction in an address before the Chicago Association of Commerce.

Dawes told his audience of business leaders that he predicted much of his forecast on a conviction that President Roosevelt will accomplish his purpose of balancing the national budget in 1936.

Of Big Importance. That program of budget balancing, he said should be of tremendous importance in restoring public confidence, which he described as tantamount in reviving prosperity to its fullest.

Dawes paid tribute to President Roosevelt for restoring confidence and for the budget balancing program.

"In this depression, which began in 1929, general confidence was restored by the banking moratorium declared by President Roosevelt in March, 1933," he said.

"President Unafraid." "In my judgment we are facing continued better conditions in business and industry in this country."

"I believe that the president will withstand the tremendous political pressure upon him to continue emergency expenditures after emergencies have passed. He does not strike one as a man who is afraid."
