**OMAHA TO HIRE 4,000**

Omaha.—The Omaha city council at a meeting late Monday approved plans for keeping 4,000 Omahans on relief work when FERA replaces CWA next week.

The rate of pay for common labor will be 40 cents an hour. Skilled labor will receive from 50 cents to \$1.20 an hour. The men will be used on street projects, boulevards work and other public improvements, on park work and other jobs.

H. C. Cusack, FERA engineer, told the council "there will be no quota of jobs under FERA; we will hire as many people from the relief rolls as the city can provide jobs for."

**TALKED TO MRS. ROOSEVELT**

Higginsville, Mo.—The telephone rang in the home of Mrs. Charles Kresse Saturday.

"The White house calling," the operator said. Over the wire came the voice of Mrs. Franklin D. Roosevelt. She told Mrs. Kresse of a visit to a civilian conservation camp near Washington at which Mrs. Kresse's son, Albert, did such a good job of acting as guide that the first lady invited him to the White house. Then Mrs. Roosevelt turned the telephone over to Albert, who was so excited he hardly knew what to say.

"And you talked to the president's wife?" the townspeople asked Mrs. Kresse Monday. "Well, well."

**COAL PRODUCTION**

Washington.—Bituminous coal production, a barometer of industrial activity, has climbed above 1929-30 levels for the first time since that winter. The bureau of mines reported that output for the week ended March 17 was 8,559,000 tons as compared with 5,123,000 tons the corresponding week last year and approximately 8,500,000 tons the corresponding week of 1930.

**HOOVER EXTENDS HIS TRIP**
