In the last innings the Eagles played air tight ball and checked the last minute attempts of the BREX to at least force the game into extra innings by a tie.

Clyde Brittain electrified the large crowd when he planted a home run to the right field bank with the bases loaded with Eagle players, this blowing up the game for the Eagles.
