Projects Under CWA Menaced if Work Held Up

Several Nebraska Projects are Included, Among These the Louisville Water Works.

Warning was given at Washington on Thursday by Secretary Ickes that the department would cancel grants on some 563 projects if work was not started on them at once and the purpose of the employment of men carried out. In the projects that may lose their grants are many in Nebraska, among these the Louisville water works.

Local controversy or regulations beyond federal control have blocked progress in some instances. Checkup in Nebraska. The 563 allotments which Ickes has ordered followed up to determine whether they should be rescinded included:

Nebraska—Gothenburg, water power, \$7,500,000; Columbus, water power, \$7,300,000; Scottsbluff, streets, \$65,900; Louisville, waterworks, \$9,000; Lexington, waterworks, \$14,000; Kenesaw, waterworks, \$11,800; Oconto, waterworks, \$11,800; Dodge, waterworks, \$16,000; Beaver City, water building, \$7,300, and waterworks, \$16,000; Wahoo, waterworks, \$18,300; Hastings, electric plant, \$48,600; Norfolk, hospital, \$8,000; Rising City, waterworks, \$14,951; Eddyville, high school, \$30,200; Kearney, gymnasium, \$1,300; Nehawka, waterworks, \$21,000.

Iowa—Shenandoah, filtration plant, \$388,000. Demands Contracts. "So far as PWA is concerned," Ickes said in a statement, "these 563 projects are all set and ready to go, and have been for weeks. The money is available, all that remains is the most important thing—putting men to work. . ."

"The 563 projects are neither under contract nor are they being advertised for contract, two essential steps in getting them under way. . ."

"The projects are estimated to produce 93 million man hours of direct employment, or 20 per cent of the total estimated direct employment that will be produced by the non federal phase of the public works program."

Money to Others. Rescinded money can be reallocated, the secretary added, to other projects which are clamoring for funds.

The list of allotments rescinded today included: Phillip, S. D., 10 thousand dollars, improvements to water works system; Modale, Ia., \$10,800, school gymnasium and auditorium; and Okaboji, Ia., 31 thousand dollars, water system.

CAR SALES BIG. The prediction made by W. E. Holler, general sales manager of the Chevrolet Motor Company, that sales would surge upward as a result of the substantial price reductions, as high as \$50.00 on some models, announced June 2, is borne out by the release of Chevrolet's sales report for the first 10 days of June. A total of 25,933 units were sold by dealers during this period, said Mr. Hitler, which betters the brisk selling period of the first 10 days of May when 21,688 units were sold, an increase of more than 4,000 units over the May period. This also exceeds the sales of the corresponding period last year.

The 10-day June figure reveals an upward trend in Chevrolet sales and reflects Chevrolet's success in reaching high-production volume to meet the public demand for the 1934 line. June sales will surpass the May total, an unusual accomplishment in the industry, Mr. Holler said.

Chevrolet sales for the year including the June 10 report reached the total of 316,181 units, a healthy margin over the same period in 1933, when sales totalled 247,121 units.

EMERGENCY LAWS UPHELD. Springfield, Ill.—The legislature's right to enact emergency laws was acknowledged by the Illinois supreme court in an opinion sustaining the validity of a 1932 special session measure.

The action of the supreme court of the United States in upholding the Minnesota mortgage moratorium law was cited as a parallel in the opinion written by Chief Justice Jones and approved by five of the seven justices. The inference was that the court would take a liberal view and approve the constitutionality of other laws designed to cope with emergency situations.

Omaha—Sheriff Henry McDonald Thursday ordered the Paxton hotel here sold July 23 under an old foreclosure action. The company operating the hotel obtained delay previously on agreement to turn in net revenues to the trustee for the bondholders, the Omaha Safe-Bond company. Attorneys for the bondholders' committee explained the sale will be little more than a transfer of title as no exchange of money or bonds will be required. No change of management is contemplated.
