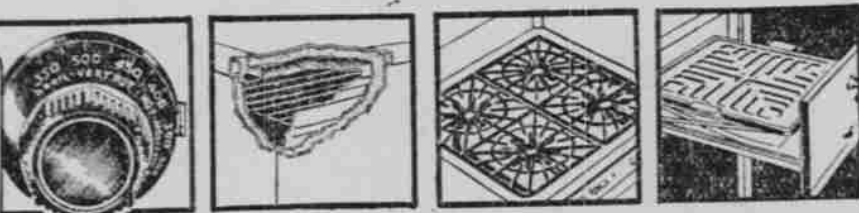
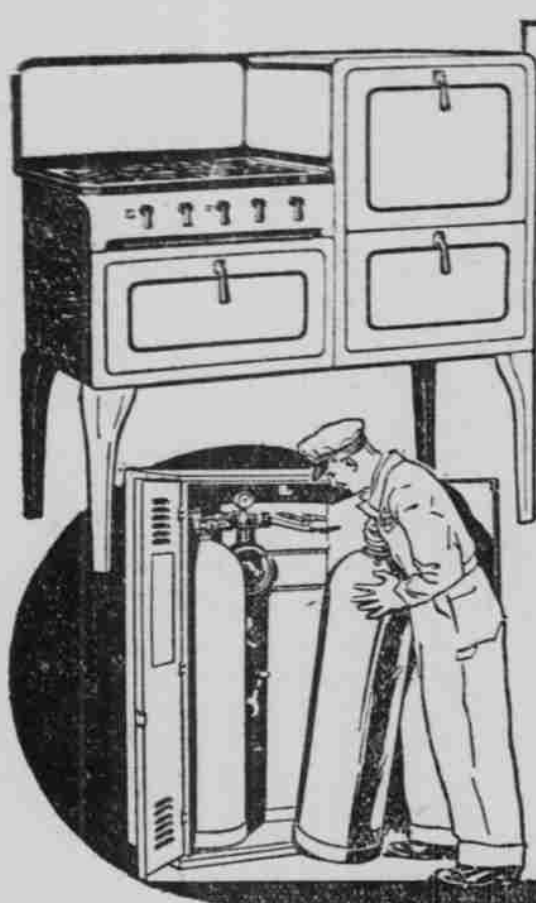

The two parties were about equally divided in the number of filings. Those who have had petitions filed for them have until twenty-five days before the election to accept the filing. Those designated by the figure one are the present incumbents seeking re-election.
