Pioneer Cass County Woman Dies at Plainview

Mrs. Harriett Royal Passes Away After Illness Covering Period of Several Months.

Miss Marriett Ellington was born at the historic village of Rock Bluffs, Cass county, Nebraska, April 1, 1852 and passed her birthday this last spring. She had been in poor health for some time and during the winter was working near Elmwood when she was taken very ill and taken to the home of her son, Ray Royal, near Plainview where she had recuperated and visited there and with another son Gerald Royal, and was there during the early portion of last week, returning to Plainview where she was making her home. Last Thursday evening while seated on the lawn of the home at about 8 o'clock, passed away very quietly.

The funeral was held Sunday at Plainview, where she was laid to rest beside the husband, who died some twenty-five years ago.

Miss Hattie Ellington was born in old Rock Bluffs when it was in its very palmist days and there secured her education, in later years being united in marriage with William A. Royal, Wm. Ellington, the father of Mrs. Royal, was the first sheriff of Cass county and resided in Rock Bluffs, and for some two years went across the river, farming in Iowa. Mrs. Hattie Royal who is sister of the late Joe C. Ellington, leaves only one brother, Charles Ellington, of Omaha.
