Mrs. William Shea, Aged Resident, Found Dead

Deceased Lady Made Home Here for Many Years-Had Lived Alone the Last Few Years.

This morning Mrs. William Shea, Sr., was found dead at her home in the south portion of the city by her daughter-in-law, Mrs. William Shea, Jr., after she had failed to receive an answer to her telephone message to the Shea home.

The elder Mrs. Shen has resided at the family homestead on Rock Bluffs avenue since the death of her husband a number of years ago, preferring this to making her home with the other members of the family. The deceased lady was a native of Ireland and came here when a young woman to make her home and it was in this city that she was married to William Shea, then a young blacksmith in the employe of the Burlington railroad in the local shops. Since their marriage the family have resided in the homestead in the south part of the city and where in the scenes of her joys and sorrows the end came to Mrs. Shea.

Mrs. Shea is survived by two daughters and one son, Mrs. Elizabeth Kearns, Minneapolis, Minnesota, Mrs. Winifred O'Malley, Galesburg, Illinois, and William Shea, Jr. of this city.
