MORE STONE WORK IS GETTING STARTED

The Cass County Quarries, Mr. Olsen reports, have a very nice contract with the Wickem Construction Co., which is being loaded at Weeping Water at the west quarry for delivery to Dakota City, Nebraska.

John Day and Co., of Lincoln, now has a very large shovel working at the west quarry and two different shifts of Weeping Water men are being employed.

Mr. Olsen also reports that the freight rates from Sioux Falls to Dakota City is 96c per ton and from Weeping Water the rate is 92c, which is quite a help for quarry men. He also reports that the stone from Sioux Falls is a granite and that it weighs 31500 to the cubic yard and that the stone from Nebraska and Cass county weighs around 2600 pounds, which makes a big difference to contractors on the river jobs.

He also says that he has been asked to bid on five different contracts for government work.

He also believes that all the laboring men of Weeping Water will be at work during the next 30 or 30 days if the work materialized.

This work will be a great help to Weeping Water and all organizations and business men should get behind Mr. Olsen and help put these big jobs over. He has had the experience and is always putting his shoulder to the wheel to boost our city and Cass county.—Weeping Water Republican.

Six Democrats Defy Platform Pledge Demand

Candidates for State and National Posts Aroused Over Committee Demands.

Recent action of the Democratic state committee in demanding that every Democratic candidate declare his allegiance to the 1932 national Democratic platform, has aroused the ire of many Democrats.

Among those who have openly defied the state committee are Governor Charles W. Bryan, candidate for Senator; William B. Banning, candidate for governor; Willis E. Reed and Floyd L. Bollen, candidates for senators; Terry Carpenter, candidate for governor and Camille Bartos Plack, candidate for congress in the Fourth district.

They agree that this is the first time in the history of Democratic politics in the state that a state committee has presumed to dictate to candidates before a primary election.

Langhorst Joins.
Joining the candidates in their refusal to obey the mandate, Louis F. Langhorst, veteran Democratic state leader and former state chairman, denounced the committee's action as uncalled for and smacking of dictatorship.

"This is the first time a state committee has ever dared to attempt to dictate to candidates before a primary election," Langhorst said in Omaha Thursday. "Several times in recent years the state legislature and people have rejected attempts to amend the primary law to give a state committee or state convention power to make a platform for candidates before a primary election."

Langhorst, who is chairman of the Banning-for-governor state committee, said he agreed with Banning's recent statement that it was none of the committee's business how he stood on public questions and that he would tell the people directly his stand on all important questions.

Banning Right.
"As former chairman of the Democratic state central committee I know this is the first time a state central committee has attempted to dictate to the party. I firmly believe Senator Banning is right. He is telling the public how he stands in no uncertain terms and here again he has announced he will not be subservient to any group of political appointees dominated by a political lawyer."

Governor Bryan has contented himself with ignoring the demand of the state committee as a "political trick" to try to discredit him. Floyd L. Bollen denounced the committee's action as a factional political movement and Terry Carpenter dismissed it with the comment it was only some more "political bunk."

Willis E. Reed said he was surprised at the action and said that as a delegate to the national convention in 1932, who voted for President Roosevelt and stood with him in his construction of the platform, he did not think it necessary for his position.

New Issues.
"New issues must necessarily arise since the platform of 1932," Reed said. "With war clouds hovering over Europe I favor putting those who clamor for war in the front ranks of the first draft. There would be no war in that event."

Mrs. Plack said she is not taking dictation from a state committee, nor from any self-appointed "guardians" of the party.

"I, for one, do not believe the Democratic party needs a guardian," Mrs. Plack said. "I believe President Roosevelt will welcome constructive criticism and helpful suggestions from members of congress. I do not believe Nebraska wants to send men or women to Washington who will be mere rubber stamps."
