

Governor Bryan to Recommend Dissolution of Body, as Work Nearly Done.

Governor Bryan will suggest the advisability of dissolving the capitol commission Monday afternoon at a meeting of that body, now that the work of constructing the \$10,000,-000 capitol and grounds is practically completed. To the legislature, he said, he will again recommend that the building be placed in the hands of the governor and its upkeep be delegated to the state engincering department. This recommendation would apply also to the governor's mansion. Bryan said he intends to remove the first of next year from the mansion to his home at 17th and B, which he has retained unoccpuied altho he maintains his legal residence there.
