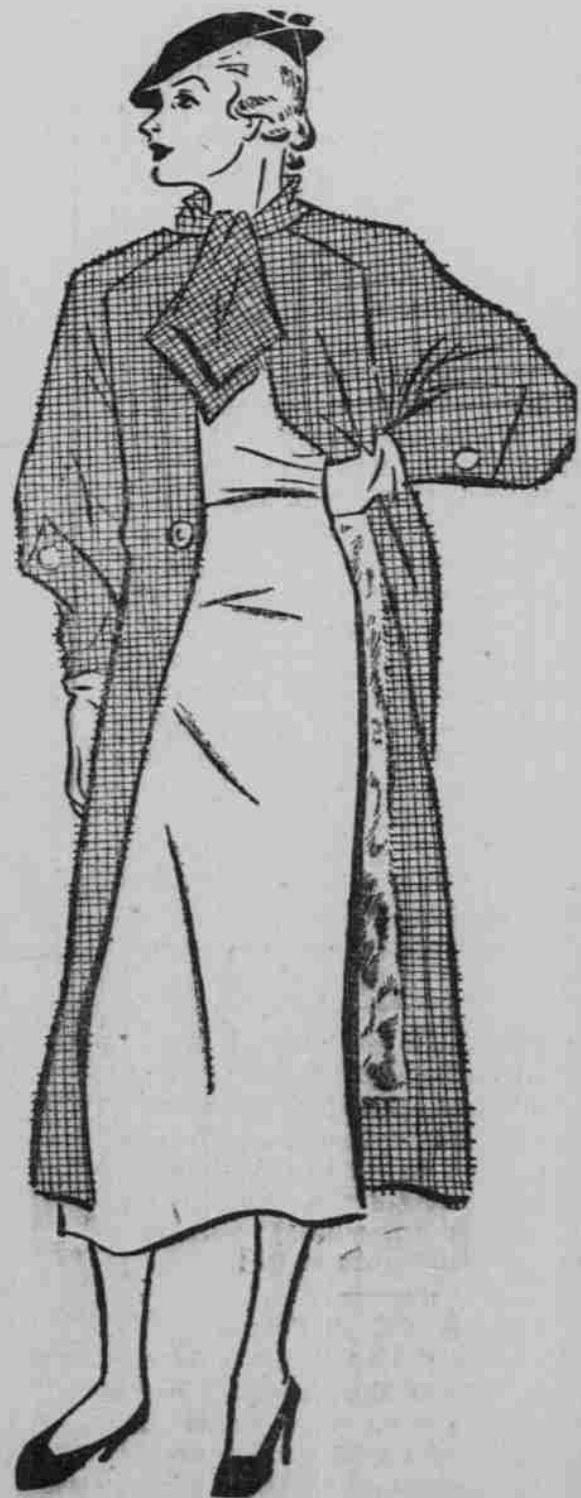

Farm Surpluses are Reported as Shrinking Daily

Richberg Says That Income is Going Up, But Still Far Below Pre-Depression Levels.

Washington.—Agricultural surpluses are shrinking, credit is better and farm income is going up, President Roosevelt was informed in a report by Donald R. Richberg on new deal farm relief. He urged continued federal crop control and emphasized farm income still is far below pre-depression levels.

The report revealed farmers have borrowed almost \$2,000,000,000 thru administration projects. Rental and crop benefit payments to farmers aggregated \$311,000,000 from August 1933 to June, 1934.

Richberg said unexampled drought had much to do with reduced crop carryovers and increased prices. He warned that agricultural adjustment must be continued another year because farmers would be tempted by drought boomed prices to over-produce again.

The report seemed to indicate that much of the agricultural improvement was attributable to dry weather. Thru Richberg, the AAA pointed out that drought did not eliminate 40,000,000 acres which have been producing farm surpluses since the war.

The report stated:
1. From August 1933 to the war 1934 farm income, including rental and benefit payments, was 32 percent above the corresponding previous period.

2. Farm income still is far below pre-depression levels but this year will exceed 1933 by 19 percent.

3. Present basic farm surpluses have been reduced by drought and control nearly to normal.

4. The 1933-34 crop year farm income was \$5,933,000,000; an increase of \$1,292,000,000 over 1932-33.

5. Federal land banks and the land bank commissioner now hold one-fourth of the nation's farm debt.

6. Industrial revival and extensive re-employment are essentials to agricultural restoration.

7. Farmers have scaled down debt and reduced interest charges with federal loans.

8. Increases in prices of what farmers buy have exceeded increases in prices of what farmers sell.

9. Actual commodity prices plus benefit payments have brought farm prices to 116 percent of the power figures.

10. Prices of things farmers buy were estimated at 122 percent of pre-war levels.

11. Since March 1933, actual farm prices of seven basic commodities exclusive of benefit payments have risen from 51 to 95 percent of the prewar 1910-14 level.

D. A. R. IS DUNNED FOR TAXES
Washington.—The D. A. R. is being dunned for \$20,908 in taxes, and if something isn't done one way or another their constitution hall here stands in danger of being offered for sale. The District of Columbia assessor's office has formally notified the national society of the Daughters of the American Revolution that unless the tax claim is paid by Dec. 1, the hall will be placed on the delinquent tax list.
