### SCANDAL JARS GOVERNMENT

Paris.—The specter of Serge Stavinsky, dead just one year, hung over another French government as the swindler's widow appeared before the chamber of deputies investigating committee.

Fighting for her release on bail, the beautiful Ariette Stavinsky told the investigators police forced her to give false testimony as to her whereabouts Jan. 4, 1934, one of the wild days when "Handsome Alex's" frothy empire came tumbling down about his ears. Politics pulling strings behind the scenes was responsible for the police action, said Stavinsky's widow, who has been in prison for months.

A new repercussion of the year old scandal—which directly or indirectly brought the fall of three governments and caused bloody riots in which twenty-nine were killed and several thousand hurt—came with charges that Henri Poulner, ex-convict and former friend of Stavinsky, was pardoned thru the influence of a former minister of justice. The charges were placed before the chamber's investigating committee.

### REMOVE DAMAGE SUIT

Omaha.—The \$100,000 damage suit of Leon S. Kopold against the Cargill elevator interests was ordered transferred from the district to federal court Tuesday. Kopold was one of eight persons injured when a dust explosion killed four men and caused property damage in excess of \$1,000,000 Nov. 23. He claims his injuries are permanent.

### CHARRED BODY IN A STACK

Garnett, Kas.—Authorities here were investigating the death of David More, 23, of Fort Scott, Kas., whose charred body was found in a strawstack near Garnett after the boy had been missing from his home since Friday noon. Officers said More had been shot.

### STOCKS OF HOISERY

New York.—Socks of hoisery on hand at the end of November were 15,940,269 dozen pairs as compared with 15,808,097 dozen pairs at the end of October and with 15,473,394 dozen pairs at the end of November, 1933, the hoisery code authority reported.

### WORK FOR BLIND PROPOSED

Chicago.—Steps to open the field of telephone switchboard operation as employment for the blind of the nation were taken at a meeting sponsored by the federal rehabilitation division, department of interior.

Illinois has pioneered in offering this work to its blind. Carl Wiley, field agent and switchboard instructor for the blind for the Illinois department of public welfare, would be used in training blind operators in other states under the plan set in motion.
