Preparing for National Flower Garden Show

Will Be Held at Omaha from March 30th to April 7th—Local Club Will Attend Event.

Word was received from the headquarters of the National Flower and Garden Show in Omaha that popular priced tickets will soon be available in Plattsmouth.

The show will be held at the Ak-Sar-Ben coliseum March 30 to April 7. These tickets, of which there are only 50,000 for Nebraska and Iowa, will be at a premium, according to the national headquarters, due to the fact that several days before the show opens the price will increase. The advance sale price will be 40c. After the sale, the price will be raised to 65c. Announcement of the ticket selling committee in Plattsmouth will be made within the next few days. Tickets will be available to residents at some convenient place.

"I should have liked very much to be able to secure at least 50,000 more tickets for the people of the Missouri Valley in this advance sale," stated Otto Swanson, head of the publicity committee. "I feel that the number received is not sufficient. I believe that there will be an attendance of at least 200,000 at the show, and I want every person in the Missouri Valley to see it. It is a huge artistic and cultural endeavor, worth the while of every man, woman and child."

"The Flower Show to be held in Omaha will be even better than the one held in Rochester, N. Y., last year," he said. "It will be a million dollar exhibition, with flowers and plants from all over the world on display. Flowers both rare and beautiful from Japan, South America and other foreign countries will be shown, including several exhibits of orchids."

"I don't think the people of the middlewest realize quite how huge an undertaking this is," Mr. Swanson concluded. "It is truly not only a national but an international exhibit. It is the biggest event that has come to the middlewest since the Trans-Mississippi Exposition."
