Iowa Robbers Get 20 Years

Had Pleaded Guilty to Looting Bank at Leighton, Iowa, January 10 —\$1,640 Is Recovered.

Oskaloosa, Ia., Jan. 15.—Two Ottumwa men will be taken to Anamosa reformatory within 48 hours to start serving 20-year sentences for participation in the robbery of the Farmers' Savings bank at Leighton, Ia., January 10.

Sentenced today, after pleading guilty to the charge of entering a bank with intent to rob, Wayne Wellman, 24, and Robert McElroy, 26, will be taken from jail here either Wednesday or Thursday, the Mahaska county attorney said.

Both men were in tears when Judge Dan Hamilton of Grinnell pronounced sentence.

Wayne Wellman had been in business with his father, Russell E. Wellman, head of the Phoenix Trust company of Ottumwa, and McElroy was connected with his father, Walter McElroy, in an abstract firm.

James A. Devitt of Oskaloosa, counsel for the pair, told the court it was the first criminal offense for each man and that the \$1,640 obtained in the robbery had been recovered.
