American Police Records Compare Well with Others

Investigation Shows That American Arrests and Punishments Hold Place With Others.

New York, N. Y .- The vaunted superiority of the British police over that of the United States in bringing murderers to justice does not appear so great percentage-wise, when convictions for homicides in the two countries are compared. The police had knowledge of 489 homicides in New York City in 1931. During the same year in England and Wales, the authorities had knowledge of 290 homicides. The percentage of convictions was 33 in Great Britain and 22 in New York. But although the percentage of convictions in Great Britain was 11 higher than in New York, at Falls City it was nevertheless lower in ten other large American cities by about the same amount.

Garrett's skeleton was found last "As a cause of death, homicide involves men far more frequently than women. In 1932, 8646 men and 2076 women were slain in the United States, exclusive of Texas. In the early years of life the homicide rates are very small for both sexes and approximately equal. After age 15, however, the begin to diverge widely and at ages 15 to 19, the male rate is twice the female rate among the white population.

"The highest homicide rates occur in early adult life, reaching a peak in the age group 25 to 34 years among males and 20 to 24 among females. Among white males the rate stays above 10 per 100,000 at all ages between 20 and 54."
