BURNETT ASKS SUGGESTIONS

Washington. — Chancellor Burnett of the University of Nebraska appealed to Representative McLaughlin for suggestions on how the university might obtain improvements thru the new federal works program in view of its inability to match federal funds.

Burnett cited the regents' request to the state planning board for \$2,455,000 for buildings and campus improvements and said the board also had tentatively approved a proposed \$300,000 student union building request.

"The union plan was approved 'rather tentatively,' Burnett said, 'on condition that the students could raise thru assessment enough money to liquidate a loan against such a building within the period prescribed by the federal government.'"

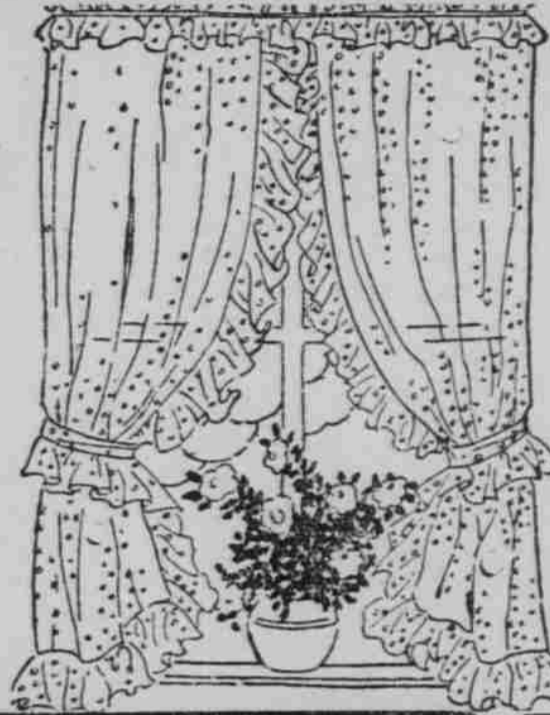
