### LIVES 'WITHIN INCOME'

Washington.—The federal government in March will probably "live within its income," for the first time in two years, treasury figures indicated.

In the first twenty-one days of the current month, huge income tax collections have carried government revenues to a new depression high of \$514,663,754, compared with expenditures of \$442,873,747. This leaves a surplus so far of \$71,790,007.

The last month in which the government was able to collect more than it spent was in March, 1933, before the start of the Roosevelt spending program. In that month the government spent \$282,367,864 and took in \$283,185,773.

## Death of Former Resident Occurs on West Coast

George F. Houseworth, One Time Clerk of the District Court Here, Dies at Long Beach.

The death of George F. Houseworth, 78, for many years a resident here, occurred on March 20th at Long Beach, California, where he has made his home for many years.

The following sketch of his life appears from the Long Beach Press-Telegram:

"George Houseworth, 78, pioneer resident of Long Beach, who had seen the city grow from a town of 2000 population and remembered when Pine Avenue was but a dusty wagon road, died this morning at his home, 532 Redondo Avenue, after prolonged illness. Mr. Houseworth had resided here since 1906.

"He was born in Burlington, Iowa, where he grew to young manhood and entered the employ of the Burlington railroad in the auditing department. Later he moved to Nebraska and was clerk of the Cass county district court at Plattsmouth. He held this position until he came west.

"In Long Beach he was employed as one of two bookkeepers by the old Long Beach Trust & Savings bank. This business was housed in what was then the old brick building in this city. He served the bank, through its many changes and after it had become a Security-First National institution, until September 1, 1926, when he was retired.

"He had lived a quiet life since retiring. He took a trip to the east coast through the canal shortly after quitting work. He spent much time in his bagin in the Sierra Madre mountains. He was a member of the First Congregational church.

"Surviving him are the widow, Mary Mason Houseworth; a daughter, Mrs. Ruth H. Leaming, Long Beach; a sister, Mrs. Charles B. Murphy, Glendale, and a brother, W. L. Houseworth, St. Joseph, Mo."

Trenton, N. J.—The cost to New Jersey for the Lindbergh kidnaping case, including the trial of Bruno Hauptmann, totals \$167,820.72. Disclosure by Col. H. Norman Schwarzkopf of the cost of the state police investigation filled a blank space in the expense account, which for all agencies involved, federal, New Jersey and New York, has been estimated to exceed 1 million dollars.

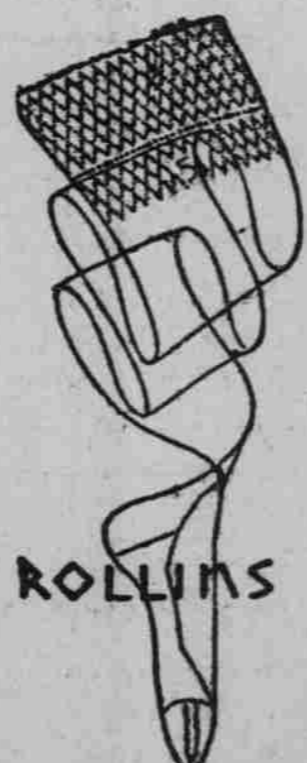
