Plan to Double Scope of CCC.



Plans for spending the \$4,800,000,000 work-relief fund include increasing the scope of the Civilian Conservation Corps which had its second birthday in April. CCC camps will be increased from 1,500 to 3,000 and the present enrollment of approximately 300,000 will be doubled. 'Forest conservation will be the principal work of the CCC. Least criticized of the New Deal agencies, the CCC promises to become a permanent institution to provide for seasonal unemployment. Benefits derived from the CCC, which has restored the mental and physical health of thousands of youth, are also shared by dependant families who receive five-sixths of the worker's pay of \$30 a month,
