Cass County Farmer Writes on AAA Program

W. F. Nolte of Near Mynard, Texas Exception to Claim of Farmers Urging Continuance of AAA.

According to the press reports, a delegation of men from Nebraska and other states have gone to Washington to back up the AAA and urge a continuation of the processing tax. While this group of men are posing as farmers or their representatives, in reality they are representing the 8,000 Nebraska employees of the AAA and county agents. When the corn-hog program was first explained to the farmers through the educational meetings, we were led to believe that it would give us parity prices for our hogs, but the result, was that the hog raiser sustained bigger losses than ever before.

The following figures will show how the program has helped me, and no doubt this holds true for the average farmer:

During the months of January, April, May, July, October and December, 1934, I marketed 17,440 lbs. of live hogs, at an average price of \$3.45 per cwt., an average weight per hog was 285 pounds. You will note that my hogs were of good market weight and marketed at intervals to be a fair yearly average, and that instead of receiving parity price the average for the year was only \$3.45 per cwt., while the average price of corn was about 70c per bu.

Now, who pays the process tax? It certainly was not the burdensome supply of hogs, that kept the prices so ridiculously low. Who has ever before witnessed a spread of 6c between cattle and hog prices? The usual spread between Chicago and Montreal Canada, on top hogs was 10c to 15c per cwt, but in 1934, the Canadian market was from \$2.50 to \$3.00 above Chicago requiring the tax plus administration expenses. While the consumer is taxed \$4.92 on hams, \$4.05 on bacon, and \$2.47 on lard, it appears that a double tax is being collected.

It may also be noted that the tax on my hogs was \$370.27 while my gross benefit hog payment is only \$240.00, and that 2/5 of this amount is still due, yet we have paid process taxes since Nov. 6, 1933.

Now the 1933 contract reduces the payments to the producer by 60%, yet the tax rate remains the same. It would be more appropriate for these salaried gentlemen to ask for a congressional investigation of the AAA and find out why our checks are from 6 to 9 months late in reaching us, and other disparity and inefficiency.

Will the 60% be used to create new additional bureaus to study our lost foreign markets, or just spent to advance another new theory? The result is that Nebraska will market about a 30% hog crop this season, and this untold loss will be felt not only in the rural sections but in South Omaha, transportation companies, and many lines of business.

While the drought is 90% responsible for the present advance in hog prices, it is the stupidity in our Department of Agriculture, and Farm Bureau that so many farmers have resolved to quit raising hogs until the tax is removed.

Let us not be deceived because a large number of Nebraska farmers are signing the 1935 corn-hog contract. Most of the farmers are too practical to pass up a bonus check on their 1932 hog crop, and since they haven't any hogs to sell will pay no tax this year; but are attempting to recover some of their loss of last year.

A real contribution to practical American agriculture would be for Prof. Tugwell to enroll the 2200 county agents and special agents for his new colonization project in Alaska, give them all a ten year leave of absence so they may discover their ever-seeking, never finding, truths. The absence of these salaried tax eating, text book advisers would truly be enjoyed by a large majority of farmers.

This horde of economic and agricultural teachers who a few years ago had a program of making two blades of grass grow where one grew before, and greater farm efficiency are now facing about, and advocating a program of scarcity, waste and destruction and seeking additional powers from congress almost equivalent to the powers the Cossacks across the Bering Strait already possess. But Mr. Tugwell has chosen a group of Minnesota farmers for pioneering, and real achievement, while our so-called leaders are floundering in theories. Yours truly,
