Otto Glaser is Given Ten Years in Penitentiary

Judge D. W. Livingston Overrules Motion for a New Trial and Gives Sentence Today.

This morning Otto Glaser, convicted by the jury in the district court of the charges of robbing the store of the Murdock Mercantile Co., as well as under the Nebraska habitual criminal act, was given a sentence of ten years on each of the counts of the indictment.

The court overruled the motion for a new trial for Mr. Glaser which was presented by Paul Topping, well known Omaha attorney and at once called the defendant to receive his sentence.

The sentence was given by Judge Livingston of ten years on each of the two counts, they to run concurrently, or a sentence of ten years in the state penitentiary at Lancaster.

The prisoner will be taken to Lincoln Thursday to be placed in the penitentiary and start serving the sentence of the court.
