RAILROAD RETIREMENT ACT Washington—Spokesmen for twenty-one railway labor organizations appeared before a senate interstate commerce subcommittee to endorse a railroad employees' retirement act designed to replace the one killed recently by the supreme court.

"The bill has the unanimous endorsement of the members of the railroad labor executives' committee and of the organization," asserted Timothy Shea, assistant president of the Brotherhood of Locomotive Firemen and Engineers. Edward A. Krauthoff, counsel for the legislative committee of the Labor Executives' association, which represents the twenty-one railway employees' organizations, said the bill is not based on the interstate commerce clause of the constitution, which the supreme court held was not broad enough to permit compulsory retirement insurance for railroad workers. He contended the bill is constitutional because it relies on the power of congress to levy taxes and appropriate money. The measure would provide 50 millions to pay retirement annuities.

Arrangements have been made for separate meetings for children during the morning sessions. Bible stories, chorus singing, object lessons, and hand craft will be included in the programs for these children's meetings. On Sundays, Sunday school will be held at the Departmental Hour, and a special Sunday afternoon Bible class will be held at 3:00 o'clock in the afternoon.

The recreational program, which occupies the afternoons, week days, will include boating on the Big Blue river, both motor boats and row boats being available, in addition to the big launch; fishing, swimming, baseball, horseshoe, tennis, and hiking. Arrangements are being made for tennis and horseshoe tournaments.

SAYS DUPED OF \$11,000 Omaha—Neils Arvidson, Red Oak, Ia., native and a New York civil engineer, faced a charge of obtaining \$11,000 under false pretenses from Dr. J. M. Johnson of Hartington.

Arvidson was arrested here more than a week ago for New York police in connection with a \$9,000 bond forgery deal.

Dr. Johnson told an assistant county attorney Arvidson induced him to invest \$40,000 in an oil deal in Italy. Arvidson represented he held a contract with Italy to buy from him 648,000 tons of oil. He had credentials represented to be from Ogdens Mills, former secretary of the treasury, and from a nephew of Benito Mussolini.

Johnson said he became suspicious when Arvidson suddenly switched to a coal promotion scheme. The doctor said he insisted on accompanying Arvidson to Italy, but the latter refused to allow him to do so. Dr. Johnson said \$11,000 of the \$40,000 was paid to Arvidson in Douglas county.
