Taxable Values of Railroads in State Reduced

State Board Applies Cut of Thirteen Percent in All Companies Operating in State.

A 13 percent reduction in the assessed valuation of railroads of Nebraska, ordered by the state board of taxation and assessment, cuts the total valuation of last year from \$167,603,363 to \$145,726,852. State Tax Commissioner Smith said:

"Only two of the major roads are in a sound financial condition, these being the Chicago, Burlington & Quincy, and the Union Pacific. The Chicago, St. Paul, Minneapolis & Omaha, which is a subsidiary of the Northwestern; the Chicago, Rock Island & Pacific, and the Missouri Pacific are in the hands of receivers. The St. Joseph & Grand Island is being operated under lease by the Union Pacific."

The reduced valuation is based largely upon the average price of stocks and bonds for a period of four years on the first day of April of each year, the date of assessment.

The assessment agreed upon by the state board shows cuts ranging from 9 percent for the Union Pacific to nearly 46 percent for the Missouri Pacific. The Burlington's reduction was 13 percent.

INTEREST CUT PLANNED

GEN. HEINTZELMAN BURIED

Washington, July 9.—Funeral services with full military honors, were conducted in Arlington national cemetery Wednesday for Maj. Gen. Stuart Heintzelman, seventh corps area commander at Omaha at the time of his death Saturday at Hot Springs, Arkansas.

A military aide representing the president and an escort from Fort Myer, Va., paid honor to the deceased officer. As an artillery caisson bearing the body entered the cemetery a 13-gun salute was fired. Another salute was fired as the casket was lowered into the grave.

Bad Men of Southwest Being Placed on Spot

Authorities Claim Smashing of the Gangs, and Crime on the Decrease Generally.

Bank bandits, the desperate men of the southwest since the days of Jesse James, rapidly are being blasted out of the region's crime picture, dispatches from Kansas City state. Moreover, authorities said, crime generally is decreasing. Law enforcement agencies are becoming increasingly efficient. Gangs have been smashed. Nowhere has an outlaw appeared to succeed Raymond Hamilton, executed last spring after warning he would "haunt" the court which doomed him for murder. Hamilton, dapper young Texan, followed Oklahoma's late Charles "Pretty Boy" Floyd to the role of No. 1 badman—bank robber, killer, stickup artist—of the southwest. Floyd ranked in notoriety with Clyde Barrow and his woman companion, Bonnie Parker.

With the shattering of the gangs, press survey shows, bank robberies have declined this year in Kansas, Missouri, Oklahoma, Colorado and Texas.

Reasons for the decrease, said Frank Stone, jr., assistant director of the Kansas state highway patrol, include "the killing of desperadoes such as Floyd and Barrow and improvement in efficiency of law enforcement units. 'Peace officers of the cities, counties and states are co-operating now for the first time in the history of the southwest,' Stone said.

B. Marvin Casteel, Missouri highway patrol superintendent, expressed the opinion crime is diminishing because of "a crystallization of public opinion against criminals. Juries no longer hesitate to do their duty and convict if the evidence warrants."

A situation almost unique in Oklahoma was noted by Alvin Shelton, in charge of state criminal identification bureau records. "I don't know," he said, "of any really desperate criminal operating in this state."
