### 'Q' JUNE PAYROLL \$206,098

McCook, Neb.—A payroll totaling \$206,098 during June for regular employees and extra crews was announced here Tuesday by the Burlington railroad. Some of the checks represented the first railway money many of the employees had drawn since they were laid off early in the depression. A bulk of the June salary budget, \$150,924, was distributed to repair crews which untangled broken and damaged tracks following the June floods. Approximately 2,000 men were employed on restoration of the tracks.

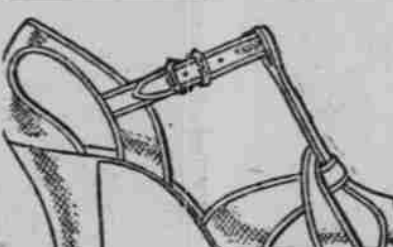

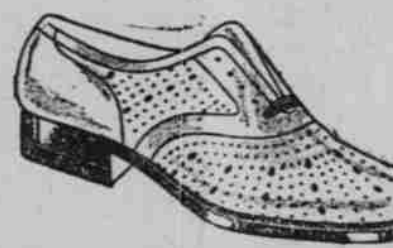

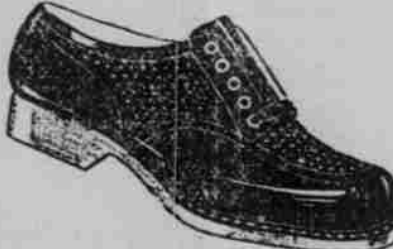
