Stander, who resides at Omaha.

The funeral services will be held Tuesday at 9 a. m. from the home to the St. Patrick's church at Manley where the requiem mass will be celebrated at 9:30. Burial will be at the Holy Sepulchre cemetery at Manley.

### LEGION BEE IS BUZZING

With the Nebraska American Legion convention at Beatrice Aug. 25-28 only a little more than a month away, candidates for state commander are rubbing the dust of their hats preparatory to casting them in the ring.

No candidates have signified definitely as yet that they would be in the race for the post now held by Fred Winter of Grand Island, but the bee was thought to be buzzing in at least five bonnets. Verne Taylor, North Platte, Fifth district commander for the past four years, was reported to be a candidate, as was George Hancock of Wauneta, Ninth district commander for three years. Edgar Boschult, Lincoln post commander, was said to be ready to enter the race and so were J. F. McDermott, former Omaha Post commander, and George Racely, former Crawford post chief.

### MOVE TO OFFSET PAGANISM

New York.—Protestant, Catholic and Jewish faiths will unite in holding a national "go to church" week end Oct. 5 and 6, the national committee for religion and welfare announced. The week end will be known as "loyalty day" and will be set aside for religious thought, Walter W. Head of St. Louis, chairman of the committee, said. The purpose of the movement is to offset the "savagery" of paganism that is beginning to inundate the world, the council said.

### NEW MEN TO CCC CAMPS

Washington.—The CCC camps announced its expansion program, started June 11, had resulted in enrollment of 85,354 new men. Total number of men in forest and park camps including the CCC, Indians in camps on Indian reservations and residents of Hawaii, the Virgin Islands, Puerto Rico and Alaska, was 404,000 as of July 13, the report said. State enrollments since June 15 included: Iowa, 1,718; Minnesota, 1,889; Nebraska, 1,857; North Dakota, 1,508; South Dakota, 747; and Wisconsin, 361.

### WARRANT FOR DEMO CHIEF

Detroit.—Recorder's Judge Thomas M. Cotter signed a blanket warrant charging Elmer B. O'Hara, chairman of the state democratic central committee, and forty-nine others with defacement of ballots and conspiracy to violate the election laws. State Senator Anthony J. Wilkowski, Detroit democrat, O'Hara, and four others also are charged with perjury. The warrants climaxed a six months investigation headed by Senator Wilkowski, of ballots cast for secretary of state last November.

### INJURED TRANSIENT DEAD

McCook, Neb.—Thomas P. Linowski, about 45, a transient, died here Thursday, the result of injuries suffered Wednesday as a train rolled over his sleeping place between the tracks.

Linowski, an overseas war veteran, was a private in Company A of the Fifty-sixth infantry. His right arm was severed in the accident, and he never regained consciousness.

### DIES OF ACID BURNS

Omaha.—Louis Baum, 38, fruit dealer, died of acid burns in his throat. Baum was brought home from Meadow, where he was found unconscious in a railroad station. Sheriff Harry Mundell of Meadow told police Baum was believed to have taken poison. He is survived by his widow and a daughter, Sylvia, now visiting relatives in Fremont. They had not been informed of his death.
