Cass County Farm Bureau Notes

Soil Conservation.

Friday evening a large group of interested farmers and land owners in Cass county met at the Farm Bureau office where soil erosion and moisture conservation were discussed. D. L. Cross, extension agronomist, and I. D. Wood, extension engineer, pointed out the contrast between conditions today and those of sixty years ago when most of this county was virgin prairie. At that time heavy rains did not cause the top soil to wash away because the thick layer of humus, which was a result of dead grass deposits, held the soil in place. The grass also held the water longer and caused more of it to soak into the ground. It required about seven thousand years for nature to deposit this rich top layer and in many instances it is entirely washed away in thirty or forty years after the land is under cultivation.

Since there is no more land to retreat to when erosion has mutilated the present farm land, we are faced with a few problems. How can we keep this rich top soil from eroding and how can we conserve some of the water which runs off?

The most feasible solution is terracing the land and practicing contour farming. Terraces tend to let the water drain off gradually and by listing contour much of the run-off water can be controlled so that it will soak into the ground. As a result the subsoil moisture is increased and naturally increased crop yields are obtained.

A common question is how can we terrace our land and how expensive will it be? The CCC camp in co-operation with the soil conservation survey furnish most of the labor and work out the plans for terracing. The average cost per acre for terracing is approximately two dollars.

Anyone interested can ask for a survey of their land and plans will be submitted to the owner before any work is done. If a satisfactory arrangement can be reached after all details are explained, the terracing can be started. No obligations are assumed in making a request to Mr. Wendling, Director of the CCC camp, or to the Farm Bureau office.

Corn Refund Checks.

About two-thirds of the refund checks on corn loans have been distributed. The remainder that have not been called for at the Farm Bureau office by August 1st will be returned to the railway commission office at Lincoln.

Timely Pasture Hints.

Mowing weeds on permanent pastures is important in rejuvenating grazing land which was severely damaged by the 1934 drought and over-grazing in the past.

Farmers are extremely busy but now is the opportune time to mow weeds. Seeding can be prevented by

mowing annuals now and perennial weeds can be damaged the most at this season. Tests show that weeds cut at the time of blossoming are weakened as the root reserves are usually lowest then. Weeds now are using much of the soil moisture which is particularly serious where grasses were seeded into pastures last spring in an effort to improve the stand.

Pastures where Downy Brome, Little Wild Barley and other annuals are mature, are worthless for pasture. These can be mowed or burned.

Farmers who seeded into drough and heat injured pastures last spring have secured good stands. If weeds are mowed soon, such pastures will be greatly improved.

Agronomists suggest when grass is extremely thin and weeds very prevalent that such fields might be plowed shallow or thoroughly disced and seeded to pasture mixtures during August following mowing. Mixtures and seeding practices are suggested in pasture circular 102 which can be secured at the Farm Bureau office at Weeping Water.

A pasture tour will be conducted in Cass county August 8th. Hints and suggestions can be obtained there that will benefit the farmer in carrying out improved pasture practices.

4-H Club Camp. Approximately seventy enthusiastic 4-H clubbers from Cass county departed Sunday for Camp Brewster where they joined campers from the three neighboring counties. They have three full days planned for them. Fun, frolic and friendship will be the keywords and the campers are supervised by trained leaders.

Baby Beeves. A number of 4-H beef calves were inspected recently. Flies and high temperatures tend to limit gains. Old grain which is very brittle this time of the year and the intense heat decrease the animals' appetite. The addition of some molasses mixtures to the ration may prove beneficial. New barley, ground, will also provide an appetizer. Molasses feeds will tend to draw flies but it can be fed away from the shelter quarters. Water should be abundant at all times.

Shade is very important to the comfort of the animal. Old sacks can be tacked over the doors and windows to darken the housing quarters and also provide a means for the animals to brush off flies.

Fly sprays relieve animals for a short time but are injurious to the hair and skin if used in large quantities.

Corn-Hog Compliance. August 1 has been designated as the final date for corn-hog contracts to be completed. Field work is progressing steadily and all measuring will be completed by the final date. Those who hold contracts and are long on their corn acreage must submit sufficient proof that they have met compliance requirements before August 1 or those contracts will be listed as non-complied. No leniency will be rendered to any contract holder regarding this matter.

There are still a number of Group II contracts which have not been returned to the office. It is imperative that they are sent in at once so that measurements and tabulations can be completed.

Group III contracts that were mailed out the first of the week should also be returned promptly to avoid further delay in completing compliance.

Apiary Demonstration. Mr. O. S. Bare, extension entomologist, will be in the county for another apiary demonstration, Friday, July 26th at the F. L. Bailey home in Weeping Water. The meeting is scheduled to start at 2 p. m.

At this meeting, the demonstration will cover re-queening, the extraction of honey where colonies are kept for that purpose, and the building up of colonies for successful wintering. Spring and summer management and seasonal attention and care have been taken up in previous demonstrations.

Make Use of Sour Milk and Cream. In midsummer heat there is likely to be more sour milk and sour cream than at other seasons. Fortunately these may be used in foods that fit the summer appetite. They should not be too sour of course—it is essential to use them at the right stage. Ice-cold buttermilk is also refreshing on a hot day. Sour milk has all the fine food values the same milk had when sweet, and these values are not easily destroyed by cooking. So you get them in biscuits or cookies made with sour milk, or in delicious waffles or waffles, gravies, sauces or pies made with sour cream.

Try thick sour cream, by itself, as a salad dressing or chopped raw vegetables, cabbage, cucumbers, rad-

ishes, and young onions, or what you will. And try it with cottage cheese, pouring it over the cheese to make it richer, smoother and more tasty.

Sour cream gravy is another luxury, especially with fried chicken. Another suggestion: make a little gravy from the fryings of fried tomatoes, using sour cream in that. Sour cream may also be used in sauce for vegetables, fish and even veal chops to make tempting, "different" summer dishes.

County Fair September 10-13.

It will soon be county fair time. The dates for this year are September 10-13. Plan now for your exhibits of vegetables, fruits, flowers, etc. Lay aside your choice specimens now during the harvest season and be prepared to help make the Cass County Fair bigger and better than ever. While you are doing your canning a wise suggestion might be to reserve one shelf to put aside a few jars of your best canning so that you may take home your share of the prize ribbons. A new department has been added this year—a flower exhibit. Mrs. Paul Murdoch of Nehawka has been selected as superintendent of this department and has prepared the list of classes in which entries will be accepted, which will appear in the annual premium book published by the Fair Society. If you are a lover of flowers and have any nice specimens, be sure to bring an entry for this department.

Cass county has no bonded indebtedness, like the state, having paid as it went. That is a worthwhile record considering the predicament many counties are in, that have not followed such a wise course.
