DAMAGE PUT AT \$3,000,000

Coshocton, O. — The tumultuous waters of the Muskingum river, gorged from overflowing tributaries, swept into southeastern Ohio with damage in their wake unofficially estimated at \$3 million dollars.

Official estimate of the damage has yet been made, however, state, city and county officials and newspapermen who have toured the stricken regions, were agreed that the estimate is approximately correct.

Two major feeder streams, the Tuscarawas and the Walhonding, began to recede slowly, indicating danger of further damage was past.

The state's worst flood in twenty-two years has exacted a toll of at least two lives and one missing, forced hundreds of families to vacate their homes, wiped out miles of highways and railroads, destroyed scores of bridges and caused heavy damage to rich lowlands.

RETAIL BUSINESS GOOD

Minneapolis. — Merchants from Minnesota, North and South Dakota, Montana, Iowa, Wisconsin, Nebraska and other nearby states, here for the semiannual Twin City market week, reported gains in their retail businesses ranging from 25 to 155 percent over last year. Some retailers in the northwest sections said while there has been some abatement in farm buying, due to the black rust scare, the storekeepers themselves were optimistic. They pointed out that outside of spring wheat, other crops are in good to excellent condition and there will be plenty of livestock feed.

COLOMBIA QUAKES NOT OVER
