## Pioneer of Elm-wood is Laid to Rest Tuesday

Mrs. Lydia Dickson for More Than Fifty Years a Resident of Coun-ty, Buried at Old Home.

The funeral services for Mrs. Lydia Dickson, 85, widow of the late A. B. Dickson, were held at Elmwood where for so many years the family had made their home and had a large part in the building up of that section of Cass county.

Mr. and Mrs. Dickson came to the Elmwood community some fifty years ago and settled on a farm south-east of the town and where they spent several years, later moving into Elmwood and where both were active in the community life and Mr. Dick-son interested in business there.

In 1910 Mr. and Mrs. Dickson moved from the old home to Lincoln where they resided for a few years and where Mr. Dickson died in 1914. The wife has since that time made her home with the daughters at Wayne and Davenport, Iowa, her death occurring at the latter city, Mrs. Dickson passing away last Thursday.

The deceased lady was a member of the Christian church over a long period of years and the last rites were in charge of Rev. Ernest Baker, pastor of the Elmwood church, as-sisted by a minister of the faith from Omaha.

Interment was at the cemetery at Elmwood where Mr. Dickson is at rest.

There are surviving three daugh-ter and a number of nieces and nephews, among these being H. F. Capwell of Elmwood and Attorney J. A. Capwell of this city.

### RED CROSS TO QUIT

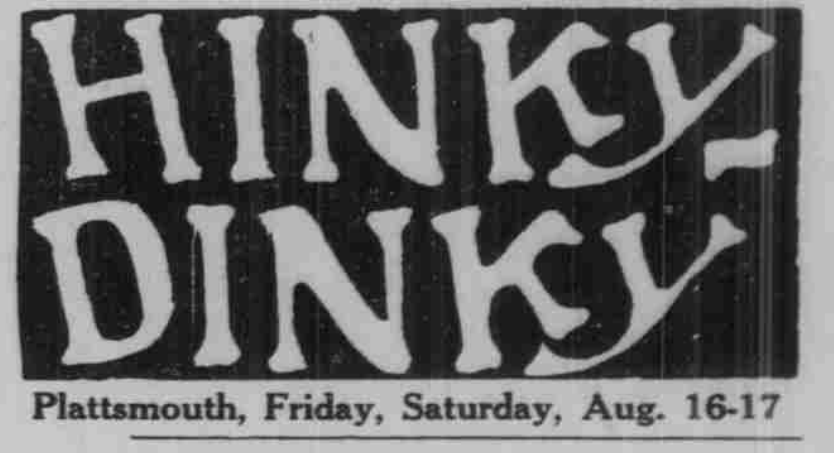
McCook, Neb.—AAlbert Evans, who has been directing Red Cross Republican river flood relief activities here for several weeks, said the or-
