REVIVAL OF PONY EXPRESS

Sacramento.—A revival of the pony express from Sacramento to St. Joseph, Mo., began when Clyde Armour, a Boy Scout, mounted his pony and dashed eastward, carrying a letter to President Roosevelt. The scout was sent away amid cheers of state and city officials who had gathered at the terminus of the original pony express. It is expected the scouts along the route riding in ten mile relays will be able to deliver the mail to St. Joseph in about ten days. From that point an airplane will fly to Washington with the mail. The letter carried in the mail bags by the pony express rider to President Roosevelt was from Governor Merriam.

PASSES ALCOHOL MEASURE

Washington.—The senate passed the administration's alcohol bill after striking out house provisions which would have permitted bulk sales of liquor.

GERMAN RAPS RESOLUTION

Boston.—The house passed a resolution condemning what it called religious persecution by the nazis in Germany. The action promptly drew from Baron Kurt von Tippelskirch, German consul general in Boston, the charge that it was "impolite and discourteous."

"I feel that it is not the business of the house to pass judgment on what takes place in Germany," Von Tippelskirch said. "In Germany we refrain from criticizing what goes on in the United States. The representatives can not really judge the situation. They are overstepping the limit. These gentlemen should sweep before their own door, and should not judge lest they be judged."

OMAHA INVENTOR DIES

Omaha.—A. F. Gillet, 73, inventor, died in a hospital here Monday. He was stricken with apoplexy at his home Sunday. Gillet was vice president of an Omaha manufacturing company. More than 100 of his patents are registered in Washington. Illness forced him to retire seven years ago and he had since devoted his time to writing. Three of his volumes were published.

PLANE VICTIMS MOVED

Cairo.—Escorted by troops and young blackshirts, the bodies of Public Works Minister Luigi Razza and his six companions who perished in the crash of a tri-motored plane in the desert last Wednesday, were borne in a slow and solemn march to the Latin cemetery. The bodies will be taken home for a state funeral as soon as arrangements can be completed.

RANSACK NEWSPAPER PLANT

Atheis.—A terrorist gang of twenty men ransacked the plant of the Venizelist newspaper Pathis, wounding several reporters and menacing the editor with their guns. The victims said they believed their assailants were monarchists as the newspaper is energetically republican.

NOT FEELING WELL

E. P. Stewart, who was at Auburn to play with the southeast Nebraska band at the rodeo, was taken ill Friday and forced to give up the last day of the playing engagement. Mrs. Stewart motored to Auburn and returned with the husband who is now recuperating at the home here.

SOUTH DAKOTA CROPS GOOD

"Crop conditions in South Dakota are the best in the twelve years that I have lived in the state," Dr. Charles W. Pugsley, president of South Dakota college at Brookings, said Saturday at Lincoln.

The educator was the guest of a group of University of Nebraska officials at an informal luncheon at the chamber of commerce. He stopped for a few hours on his return to South Dakota after a visit with his parents at Woodbine, Ia.

"The corn crop in the eastern section of the state is just about as big as they have ever had," he said, "and our corn isn't nearly as badly burned as what I have seen in Nebraska. Our small grains were hurt some but the crop is better than normal except in the spring wheat section."

"Our farmers are all hopeful and optimistic." The arbitrary ruling forcing all physically fit off relief rolls in order that farmers might secure harvest hands caused little suffering and met with but little criticism according to Doctor Pugsley. The state, he said, is making progress in paying off the heavy debt incurred by South Dakota's experience with socialistic enterprises several years ago.

HARGREAVES ASKS PARDON

Washington.—Richard L. Hargreaves, former president of the First National bank of Beverly Hills, Cal., has asked for a pardon to escape serving his three years' sentence for violation of the federal banking laws. He has been in jail since July 8, following his conviction on charges of submitting erroneous statements to the comptroller of currency and misapplying bank funds. The federal pardon attorney is investigating the application and will make recommendations to the attorney general.
