Oldest Resident of the State on His Deathbed

Solomon Riekner, 114, of St. Paul, Is Sinking Rapidly—General Weakening of System.

St. Paul, Neb.—Solomon Riekner, 114, probably the oldest white man in America, was reported sinking rapidly Wednesday and physicians believed he was dying.

The aged Nebraskan, whose life span goes back to a period when the guns of the battle of Waterloo were still echoing thru Europe, was believed certain to be approaching the end of his life span.

Doctors attending him at the home of Mrs. Cora Corbett, his daughter here, said that his decline was caused by a general weakening of his entire system.

Riekner two years ago injured his back while chopping wood and never fully had recovered. During the past eighteen months he had been able to walk but had spent most of his time in an easy chair.

WRITES OF OLD TIMES

To the pioneers and citizens of Rock Bluffs:

I read in the Plattsmouth Journal that on August 25 the annual get-together and celebration in honor of the pioneer days back as far as the early 1850's.

When I first saw Rock Bluffs in 1869 it was a prosperous thriving and lively village. However, since that time many have moved to other localities, and many deaths, and today Rock Bluffs is just a memory; and a few years ago I, as a thresherman had the pleasure of having my feet under many of their tables, and slept in their beds. The hospitality of these good people will always be pleasant memories of the past, and my only regrets are that I am too far away to be with you on August 25.

However I will remember the day and wishing you all a very pleasant day of celebration and hoping at some future gathering I may be with you as I consider myself an old settler since 1869 and not only that I found and married one of Rock Bluffs fairest maidens in 1878. There is the poem for the good "Threshing Dinners":

You can talk of chicken dinners,
You can rave of banquets rare
You can tell about the dainties
On a hotel bill of fare.
You can have your Chinese dishes
But for me they have no charm
Like the good old threshing dinner
That they serve down on the farm.

When you've heaved away at bundles
Till your back is tired and sore
Or you've trampled, around the straw pile

Where the dust comes boiling o'er,
Tis a mighty pleasant feeling
When the stillness fills the air
And you near the call for dinner
To that threshin' bill of fare.

There's a grand rush to the windmill
Where the soap and towels await;
There's an odor from the kitchen,
Makes you want to grab a plate
And be sure to get your portion,
But there's no cause for alarm,
For there's always lots of vittuals
When they thresh down on the farm.

Now sometimes they feed you mutton
And sometimes they feed you ham,
Then there's always lots of "taters"
And of beans and peas and jam;
Then sometimes the old red rooster
Meets a threshin' dinner fate,
And a great big pan of dumplings
Seems to round out your plate.

Oh! my goodness save from harm
The good old threshing dinner
That they serve down on the farm.
