**MANY HEARD DUANE HARMON LAST NIGHT**

Playing "Carnival of Venice," by Del Staigers, the number on which he had previously won the Mid-West amateur radio contest in Omaha ten days ago, Duane Harmon, Weeping Water cornetist, was heard last night over the NBC network, playing on the "Town Hall" program from the NBC studios in Radio City.

The young man did full justice to the selection, displaying a remarkable playing ability as he tripped-tongued to high notes repeatedly.

He was drawn to appear in the first half hour division, playing at 7:15. A check-up of the applause recording machine revealed the winners of the first division to have been a ten year old girl who gave the dramatic scene from "Dr. Jekyll and Mr. Hyde" and a girl marimbaphone player. To radio listeners, it appeared Harmon had received fully as much applause as the latter, but the machine accurately measures the volume and gave the result as above.

Second division winners included a girl violinist and a girl accordionist. In the final check, the ten year old girl won first, the violinist second and the accordionist third. The marimbaphone player, placing fourth, was out of the money.

There remains the mail vote, with a \$75 cash prize to be announced on next week's program, and Cass county friends of young Harmon, who appeared at the Korn Karnival here Saturday night, just before leaving for the east, could do nothing finer than send a vote for him, addressed to "Town Hall, care NBC, New York City."

Application for a place on the Major Bowes amateur hour was made as soon as the party arrived in the east, but with an average of 800 auditions a week, from which twelve contestants are selected for this program, it is rather uncertain that Duane will have further opportunity of playing over the network.

**Omaha Lady Drowned Monday at Holman Pit**

**Mrs. Hazel Stiles, Omaha, Unable to Swim, Perishes in Cold Waters; Pit Had Closed for Summer.**

Tragedy ended the outing of an Omaha group on Monday afternoon when Mrs. Hazel Stiles, 24, of 2416 North 16th street, was drowned in the pits at the Holman park north of this city and just south of the Platte river bridge.

The park has closed the swimming season and withdrawn the sale of permits as well as the lifeguard service, but the Omaha party arriving at the park about 2:30 Monday afternoon decided to take a dip in the water. Mrs. Stiles, unable to swim, had splashed around in the waters of the pit for some time when she suddenly stepped off into the deep water of the pit and sank before her companions could reach her.

Bill Lane, 3214 A street, Omaha, the only member of the party that could swim, was one of the other side of the pit when the tragedy occurred and before he could swim the seventy-five yards to the spot where Mrs. Stiles had disappeared she had sank. He dived a number of times in an effort to reach the unfortunate woman, but without success.

Paul Doney, 5619 South 30th street, who was also a member of the party, was unable to swim and ran to the refreshment stand to summon aid. He found Dick Edwards of this city, who had served as lifeguard in the summer, at the stand and who at once ran to the scene of the tragedy and started diving for the body, but without success.

Sheriff Homer Sylvester and Deputy Sheriff Walling, called from this city as well as members of the South Omaha police department, were called and the body was finally hooked with a hay rake towed by a length of wire and brought to shore.

The body was brought to the Sattler funeral home here to be prepared for burial and to await word from relatives as to their wishes.

The deceased woman is survived by a daughter, eight years old who resides in Omaha.

**ROOSEVELT'S OMAHA DATE**

Omaha.—The special train carrying President Roosevelt to the west coast this week end is tentatively scheduled to reach Omaha at 11:30 a. m. Saturday and to remain here 15 minutes, it was learned. The train is scheduled to come here over the Burlington tracks from Kansas City. It will leave for the west over the Union Pacific tracks, with a brief stop tentatively scheduled at Fremont. From Omaha the president is planning to go direct to Boulder dam.

**BANK PAYS 100 PERCENT**

Ashland.—Payment of a final 30 percent to depositors of the National bank of Ashland has been authorized to bring repayments to 100 percent. P. L. Hall, receiver, announced Thursday. The bank was suspended March 4, 1933, and placed in receivership July 16, 1934. The total paid out in dividends amounts to \$179,969.41.

**ITALY BUYS SUPPLIES**

Nairobi, Kenya.—Commercial statistics showed the Italian government already has brought supplies for shipment to Italian Eomalland totaling £110,000. The orders still are being placed. Shipments include food, cattle, clothing and road materials.

North Platte.—Elmer Clifford Schneider, 23, died in a hospital here Sunday night from injuries suffered in an automobile accident. Kermit Anderson was also injured when the car in which the two were riding hit loose gravel. He was taken to Maxwell.

**DIES OF ANTHRAX**

Pierre, S. D.—Clyde Daly, 55, Philip, died at a Pierre hospital from an illness diagnosed as anthrax. The infection is reported to have started from a bite by a fly which carried the disease.

**LOSES HAND IN CUTTER**

York, Sept. 22.—The right hand of Pete Ruhl, 55, was severed by an ensilage cutter on a farm near here. Ruhl was brought to a York hospital for treatment.

**INDIAN BUREAU FUNDS**
