Rocks in the Cargo. The weight tricks, the investigator described, included tampering with

scales, concealed compartments and distribute false bottoms in the trucks, filling of 'gasoline" tanks with water, placing of rocks in hidden places in the truck beds and actual shoveling off of forty or fifty bushels in a country lane under cover of darkness between the time the load was weighed and delivered to the farmer buyer.

One trick especially is worth describing, according to the investigator. It was used by an operator of the big type truck that has a trailer, and required the use of a small air jack. In weighing the practice is to run the trailer wheels only on the scales. The truckmen discovered that by placing the air jack, connected by hose with an air pump operated by the engine, on the center truck pivot and against the trailer frame, the amount registered on the figure bar of the scale could be changed from the true weight as much as desired. The dicerence from the real weight could be made either way, less or more, scrording to where the air jack was placed. Thus the trucker could weigh in may 22,000 when buying for blastelf and weigh out only 18,000 when selling, profiting 4,000 pounds on the trick .- St. Joseph (Mo.)
