Also forbidden by new orders was the practice of drinking liquor on premises licensed for package sale only. The order also banned customers from loitering on beer or liquor licensed premises after the closing hour fixed by city or village or-

"It is further provided," the order continued, "that the sale to any customers of any quantity of liquor for liquor in his place of business after the closing hour, shall be deemed a violation of this regulation."

Penalty for violation of any of the regulations was to be revocation or suspension of the violator's li-
