BIG STILL CONFISCATED

Grand Island.—Two men were arrested and a twenty-five gallon still with accessories alleged to have been used in the distilling of whisky, was confiscated by federal officers in Hall county following the arrest of a third man who allegedly possessed more than a gallon of "moonshine" whisky. The prisoners are Henry Behrens and a brother-in-law, Fred Weldon, both residing on a farm north of Cairo. In addition to confiscation of the twenty-five gallon whisky still, the officers said they found 150 gallons of whisky mash, two gallons of alleged "moonshine," ten fifty-gallon barrels, and a number of kegs and jugs in the house in which the still allegedly was operated.

BEMOANS SCARCITY OF WORK HORSES

Lincoln, Dec. 4.—Henry Behrens, farmer member of the state board of control, Wednesday bemoaned the scarcity and high cost of work horses. "The state has some tractors and power machinery," he said, "but needs work horses. Of recent years, a colt was almost a curiosity. We are feeling the effects. Young work horses are hard to find and prices range from \$300 to close to \$400."

BATTALIONS DISSOLVED

Rio De Janeiro.—President Vargas dissolved the 21st and 29th battalions of light infantry and the third regiment of infantry because of their participation in last week's uprisings.

General Paul Hunts Missing Half Million

Seeks to Learn Why \$600,000 Allotted for Armories in State Not Yet Available.

Lincoln, Dec. 5.—Adjutant Gen. H. J. Paul of the Nebraska National Guard was engaged Thursday with the "mystery of the missing half million dollars."

Several months ago, General Paul said, President Roosevelt approved a Nebraska request for about \$600,000 worth of armories in 18 cities. Since then money has been made available for only three projects—an armory at Falls City, one at Kearney and a \$23,000 stadium at the National Guard camp at Ashland.

Land Acquired.

Most of the other cities have acted under a new state law, to acquire land and are prepared to deed it to the state as soon as the rest of the money is made available. Omaha, however, has not selected a site for its armory to cost \$110,000.

Lincoln, Beatrice, Hastings, Fremont, Hartington, Gering, Scottsbluff, Holdrege, Columbus, Nebraska City, North Platte, Lexington, Grand Island, York and Seward are ready to go, Paul said. The Lincoln armory is scheduled to cost \$150,000; the others \$25,000.

Wants to Know Why.

Paul dispatched several letters to federal authorities Thursday asking why the money had not been made available.

A. T. Loddell, chief of the state bureau of roads and bridges, will be in Washington next week and will check into the matter.

RAPS 'PATRONAGE GRABS'

Buffalo, N. Y.—The public is paying 2 billions a year in political salaries "to maintain our party machinery," H. Elliot Kaplan, national secretary of the civil service reform league, said in an address here.

Discussing "patronage grabs" at a league of women voters' conference, Kaplan said "we in America fail to appreciate we have virtually turned over the political organization of the nation, state and municipality. With more than 1,500,000 positions in the public service having a payroll of more than 2 billions that is virtually the price we are paying to maintain our party machinery."

NAVAL DELEGATES CONFER

En Route to Southampton.—The United States delegation to the London naval conference held the last of its meetings aboard ship, perfecting its plans for participation in the parley.

Norman H. Davis, chairman of the delegation, in a speech, set forth the American hopes for an amicable agreement on naval limitation despite the general belief that the outlook was dark. The ship was expected to reach Southampton Friday.

PROMOTER GOES TO AFRICA

Paris.—Francis M. Rickett, British promoter, was reported by his pilot to be en route to Ethiopia where last summer he negotiated a huge oil concession from which American interests withdrew after consultations with the state department. Rickett arrived by airplane, flown by Lee Smith, an American. Except to say he was "en route to Cairo and farther," Rickett would not comment, but Smith said he was going to Ethiopia.

SCHOOL TEACHERS PARADE

Mexico City.—Twelve thousand rural school teachers demonstrated in front of the national palace in protest against the numerous killings and mutilations of socialistic instructors in recent weeks.

Two women teachers from Jalisco, whose ears were cut off by rebels, led the parade to the palace. Speakers demanded safety guarantees and increased salaries but pledged their support of President Cardenas and of socialistic education.

MRS. W. D. FUNK DIES

Bloomfield, Neb.—Mrs. W. D. Funk, 75, wife of a former Knox county attorney and pioneer resident of this section, died suddenly Friday of a heart ailment. Her husband, returning from the annual convocation of the Masonic grand lodge in Omaha, was unaware of his wife's death until he arrived home. At Omaha he was honored for his services as past grand high priest. The Funks celebrated their golden wedding anniversary a year ago.

Omaha.—Clarence Cunningham, 31, and William A. Wahls, 35, pleaded guilty before District Judge Yeager to a charge of robbing Mrs. Sophie Lochs, 70, of \$6. Cunningham and Wahls told Judge Yeager they had been informed that Mrs. Lochs had a large sum of money hidden at her home. Cunningham also confessed to the judge participation in two other robberies and one burglary. Paul Narko, 22, Omaha, pleaded guilty to a charge of breaking into an office station. Judge Yeager deferred sentence in both cases.

WHO GETS POTATO MONEY?

Hastings, Neb.—Sheriff Worthy Wood sold 66 sacks of potatoes at auction but must wait until Thursday to know who is to receive the proceeds. The potatoes were taken from the home of Lawrence Thiede to satisfy a \$626 judgment. Immediately Mrs. Thiede claimed ownership of the potatoes, declaring her husband had no interest in them. A five-man jury will sit Thursday in Justice James F. Crowley's court to determine who shall have the money from the sheriff's sale.

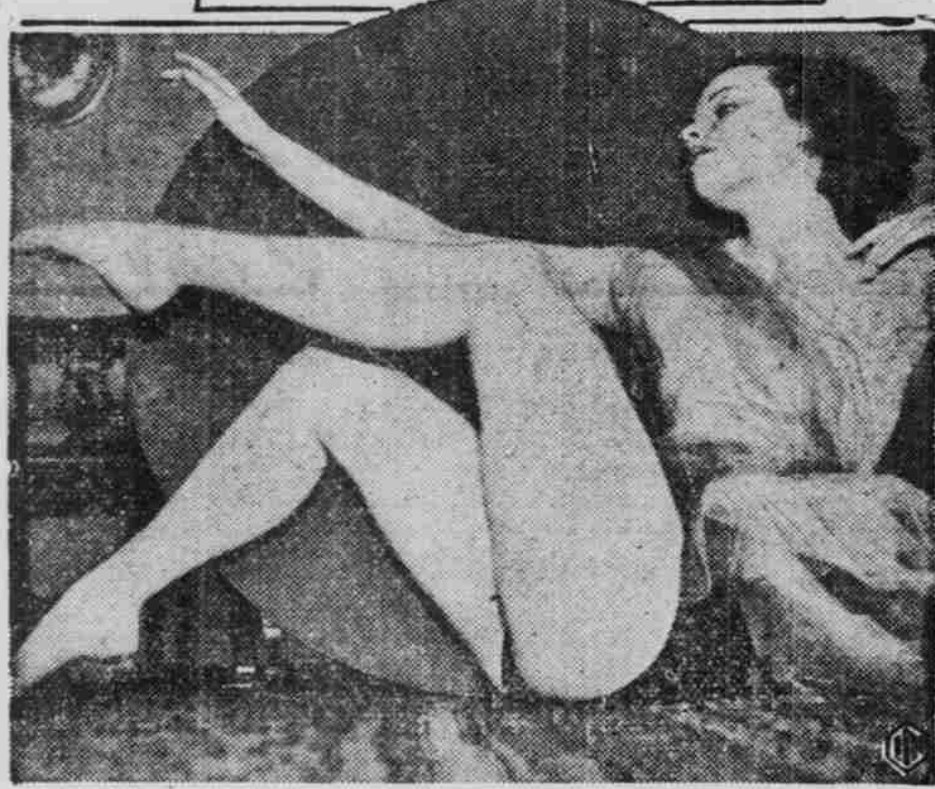
AN OUTBREAK OF SUN SPOTS

Pasadena, Calif.—Scientists watched for earthly manifestations of what Dr. Seth B. Nicholson termed the largest outbreak of sun spots since the beginning of the new cycle, late in 1933. Dr. Nicholson, Mount Wilson observatory astronomer, reported between 100 and 200 spots on the soia rvisage and said they would be

visible for two or three days, until carried out of sight by the sun's rotation. University of Washington students said they saw a sun spot group 160,000 miles long. The sun's diameter is 864,000 miles.
