Protest Being Singled Out in Epidemic Fight

Omaha Ministerial Union Believe It Equally Important Commercial Gatherings be Halted.

Efforts to stamp out the spread of scarlet fever in Omaha is meeting with some arguments from sources there, as indicated from the World-Herald:

"Members of the Ministerial union, after hearing Dr. Millard Langfeld, director of public health, ask for their co-operation in combatting spread of scarlet fever in the city, bombarded him yesterday with questions as to why the suggestion has not been made to the movies, schools and other places where children gather."

"After a discussion which at times grew stormy and delayed Bishop Shaylor's presentation of an address upon the Bible, the meeting pledged the union to do all it can to co-operate with the health department and suggested that the department call on other groups to do the same."

"Declaring there were many mild cases of scarlet fever in the city, Dr. Langfeld listed the figures for the last four weeks as 90, 92, 197 and 150. Twenty-five new cases since Saturday noon were reported yesterday."

"Dr. Langfeld reiterated that there is no official ban on meetings when he was asked if there would be any order on Christmas programs."

"Sunday school attendance, it was learned, fell off considerably in several churches Sunday. At First Central Congregational church it decreased nearly a third. At First Christian church the Sunday school attendance reduction was somewhat similar. Other churches reported smaller percentages of non-attendance."
