VISIT IN IOWA

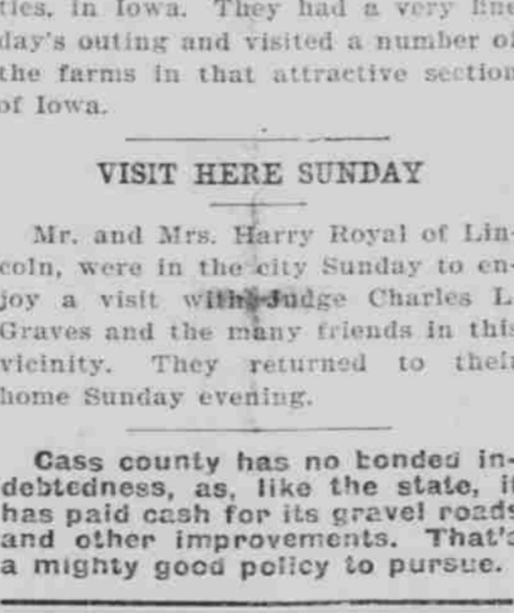
