College Enrollment Shows an Increase

More Than a Million Young Americans Are Continuing Their Studies.

Cincinnati—Dr. Raymond Walters, president of the University of Cincinnati, reported that more than a million young Americans are continuing their studies in colleges and universities of the United States. His annual survey of university and college registration put the figure at 1,071,320 in 588 institutions, not including normal schools, accredited by the American council of education. Of the number, 705,989 are full time students, the rest attending part time and summer school classes. Altogether, his report said, total enrollment is 6.6 percent above that of 1934, which in turn was 5 percent above that of 1933.

Moreover, Dr. Walters commented,

"economic improvement in many sections is indicated by fewer applications from full time students for installment payments of tuition and notes payable after graduation, and by increased attendance of part time and summer school students."

His survey indicated a shift in trend in student plans. "Liberal arts courses, which now form an essential requirement for admission to medical, law and other professional schools," the survey said, "continue to be the training most largely sought by those entering American colleges and universities. The proportion, however, is diminishing; in 1933, 75 percent of freshmen chose a liberal arts curriculum; this fall the percentage was 71.8."

"This fall, the increase in liberal arts freshmen over 1934 is 4.6 percent, but the increase in freshmen taking engineering is 12.1 percent; the increase in freshmen taking courses in commerce or business administration is 12.2 percent, and the increase in freshmen starting upon courses in agriculture is 20.3 percent."

Dr. Walters reported larger enrollments in all sections of the country.

THE 200-INCH EYE

The human race is on the verge of learning hitherto unrevealed secrets about the universe. The casting of the great 200-inch telescope lens for the great new observatory in California has been successfully completed. It will take three years to grind it to the proper shape to reflect and magnify the heavens. The unaided human eye can see only six thousand stars. GUARD SHIPMENT OF CASH

Chicago.—A heavy guard of federal agents conveyed \$200,000 to the post office at suburban Lake Forest on an advance tip that Alvin Karpis, public enemy No. 1, was aware of the plan to ship the money and meant to seize it.

Postal inspectors kept the source of the tip secret, but took every precaution for protection, the informer's knowledge of the post office department's shipping plans accepted as evidence that the underworld was on the alert. "G" men, special police, and a state's attorney's detail armed with machine guns rode with the money on a train that was carefully searched on the twenty-five mile run north from Chicago.

More Than a Billion is Spent Making Jobs

New York City Gets Largest Allotment, Nebraska Receives 4.5 Million.

Washington.—Leaders of the relief drive announced that to date Comptroller General McCarl has released \$1,068,344,963 of the \$4,000,000,000 jobs fund for expenditure by state officials of the WPA.

McCarl is arbiter of government spending. His approval is necessary before any of the \$4,000,000,000 program, including \$40,000,000 for the national youth administration can be expended. State WPA administrators will have latitude in choosing projects to prosecute with the \$1,058,344,963. McCarl has already approved projects totalling four times that figure, so the administrators may have leeway in adjusting WPA work

to employment opportunities created by other agencies.

WPA officials said Saturday a report on the number of persons now employed on work relief will be delayed until Corrington Gill, assistant administrator in charge of statistics, returns Monday from a trip.

The report of McCarl's releases showed that New York City had received more than any state. With a WPA quota of about 220,000 jobs, it has been allotted \$121,426,872, compared with \$50,875,779 for the remainder of New York state. Pennsylvania, with \$119,024,164, received the next largest allotment, and the smallest went to Nevada, which received \$1,296,416. Other allotments include Nebraska, \$4,571,894.
