# CARBON MONOXIDE POISON?

Whether Edith B. Stone, widow of Chattanooga dentist, is entitled to recover \$10,000 or \$600 only from the Physicians Casualty association of Omaha was argued and submitted to the supreme court Wednesday. The smaller amount, under the terms of the policy, was payable only when death followed suffocation from illuminating or other gases or when poison was taken accidentally.

Dr. Stone died from carbon monoxide poisoning, being found in his garage with his motor running. His widow claims that carbon monoxide is not a gas, that he did not die from suffocation, and that while it is a poison the policy clause meant the smaller amount would be paid when poison was taken accidentally whereas in this case death resulted from an involuntary act on his part. The company took the position that it was a case of suicide and cited the fact that some time before he had been found in his office with gas jets open. The plaintiff said that this was accidental and occurred after he had been out to a convivial professional meeting.






