### PLATTSMOUTH STUDY CENTER

The Plattsmouth Study Center is still accepting registrations for University of Nebraska correspondence courses. Lately a few new students have registered and several new classes were started. At present there are 22 students registered for 85 college hours. You are entitled to regular University of Nebraska credit on completion of any of the correspondence courses. The Plattsmouth Study Center is the largest study center in Nebraska as to the number of students enrolled.

Study Center rates are very reasonable, a \$1.00 registration fee and 75c per college hour for high school courses, \$1.50 per course for each semester. For those folks who cannot afford to go away to attend college or those who wish to secure high school credit, this should be of special interest as they may earn college or high school credits while at home or working. College courses in agriculture, business organization, chemistry, English, economics, typewriting, education, engineering, fine arts, geography, geology, foreign languages, history, journalism, mathematics, psychology, physiology, political science, sociology and zoology may be studied.

Last year a number of people registered at the study center and secured credit during the summer in that manner, rather than going to summer school. The same program may be carried out again this year. Students are permitted to work as rapidly as they like so no student is held back. Hence it is not necessary to attend any set length of time.

## Bible School Lesson Study!

Sunday, May 23rd By L. Neitzel, Murdock, Neb.

**"The Weakness of Esau"**  
Gen. 25:27-34; 27:4-15.

In the development of this lesson we will learn the weaknesses of the four characters and the part they play, and the overruling hand and wisdom of God, how he brings to fruition his plans and designs, even through sinful trickery and scheming of men. The student of this narrative exclaims with Paul: "O, the depth of the riches, both of the wisdom and knowledge of God; how unsearchable are his judgments and his ways past finding out." (Rom. 11:33).

Of these four characters the first to analyze would be Isaac. We find him an easy-going, peace-loving, non aggressive, kindly soul, who would rather move his whole household than to have any misunderstanding with a neighbor; rather abandon his rights than assert them; but he had developed with age a desire, a craving for good eats, especially venison such as Esau only could furnish and prepare, hence his love and affection for this boy.

Second to analyze is Rebekah, a beautiful, loving, devoted mother, who showed her preference for Jacob, her younger son; and by scheming and Rebekah caused much mischief and trouble in the family; she even went so far as to interfere with the plans and designs of God, to see to it that her favorite came into possession of the blessings that God had intended for him, even if she had to lie and cheat, and caused Jacob to do the same.

Third is Esau, the care-free, sports-loving, irreverent, selfish man, who would readily give up for a good meal, his birthright, that carried with it not only a double portion of the inheritance, but gave the holder precedence as head of the family or tribe, above all it constituted the possessor, priest and spiritual head of his people.

Last of this group is Jacob, the home-loving, gentle, tractable, easily led lad, but ready to drive a close bargain, taking advantage of another's misfortune or distress; even if he had to stoop to lying, cheating, etc. With him, the means justify the ends. This characterization of the actors will aid us in understanding their life. We note first the different types, the difference in character and disposition, in these two boys from the same parents. The unwise acts of the parents in showing such partiality; which led to a divided home, hatred, jealousies and
