### Cass County Farm Bureau Notes

**Contract to Be Let for Rural Electrification.**  
Directors of the Eastern Nebraska Public Power district are now advertising for bids for the construction of lines for Project Number Two, which includes 421 miles of rural lines in the western part of Cass county and extending into Otoe and Saunders counties.

In Cass county the rural territory will be covered from the Lancaster county line east to the road a mile east of Wabash. Construction of the rural lines will probably start late in July as the contractors usually start about 30 days after the letting.

Project Number One, consisting of about 350 miles of lines in the vicinity of Tecumseh has just been completed.

#### Many Poisoning Hoppers.

Hundreds of farmers throughout the county are cooperating in the war on grasshoppers. More than forty ton of ready mixed bait has been distributed by the county farm bureau to farmers throughout the county.

Many farmers coming to the office to purchase more bait report excellent kills with their first application.

The young hoppers have not formed any particular food habits so they take to the poison bran mash readily.

#### Vacation Camps.

District 4-H camp and also Mothers Vacation camp have been scheduled for the latter part of July. District 4-H Club camp, composed of Cass, Douglas, and Sarpy counties will be held at Camp Brewster, July 25th to 28th inclusive.

Mothers camp, which includes some twelve counties in southeastern Nebraska, also convenes at Brewster, July 20-23. Watch the farm bureau notes for further information regarding both camps.

#### Read for Facts and Fun.

With Cass county home demonstration project club women planning to "brush up" on their home reading this summer as an extra part of their project work, interest in discussions concerning reading at the meeting of the Nebraska Council of Home Demonstration clubs is increasing. Miss Nellie Carey, executive secretary of the State Public Library, is to address the convention scheduled for North Platte, June 15-16.

"Read for facts and fun," is the title to Miss Carey's address. She will make suggestions probably concerning summer home reading and recommend books for project reading.

A new department in home demonstration project work this year is the reading suggestions which will be passed on to club members. There were fifty-one clubs enrolled in the work the past year and fifteen of them will participate in the reading work this summer.

#### Weed Eradication Gains.

Bindweed, Nebraska's Public Enemy No. 1 when it comes to weeds, can be killed by summer tillage at a lower cost than originally deemed necessary. Dr. F. D. Keim, chairman of the agronomy department at the Nebraska college of agriculture, this week reported on experimental work showing the decreased costs. This study showed the cost of eradication by summer tillage did not run over \$10 per acre.

Using a seven-foot duck foot cultivator and cultivating from 3 to 4 inches deep, the following conclusions were reached in the experiment:

"Average of intervals between cultivation on ten fields for the first year of tillage was 8.2 days and for the second year, 10.2 days.

"Number of cultivations during the first year on the different fields ranged from 10 to 19 with an average of 12.5. During the second year of tillage, the number of operations ranged from 1 to 14 with an average of 9.14.

"Plowing the fields at a depth of 7 inches checked bindweed from 9 to 19 days with an average of 14.2 days. One plowing was equivalent to about two cultivations.

"The average acreage cultivated per hour on all fields was 1.86 acres.

#### State and Federal Entomologists Visit County.

O. S. Bare, extension entomologist from the college of agriculture and Mr. Shotwell, of the U. S. department of entomology, visited the county last Friday looking over the hopper situation. With the agricultural agent

they visited nine farms in the county. Five of these farms had used poison bran mash and a thorough inspection of the baited areas revealed a good kill. The hoppers being so small, the dead ones are a little hard to find. They crawl away under rubbish and weeds to die.

Mr. Shotwell also called attention to the fact that ants, ground beetles, spiders and many other insects carry away the dead ones. The quicker, more visible evidence that the bait was effective was the absence of living hoppers where they had been noticeably numerous before the bait was scattered.

On all of the nine farms the hoppers were concentrated along ditches, fence rows, edges of alfalfa fields, and in pastures. Mr. Shotwell had just come from Oklahoma and Kansas. He said in Oklahoma they were doing crop damage now, while in Kansas the situation was much like it is in Cass county, only the hoppers were larger and just ready to break for the crops. Shotwell warned that if poisoning was not done in the very near future, the hoppers would soon be leaving their present feeding grounds and start on the growing crops that border these places.

#### Will Discuss Farm Legislation.

Cass county farmers interested in forming either a soil conservation or bindweed district or both under the newly-passed legislation will have the opportunity to learn the necessary steps if they attend the annual Agronomy Field Day at the Nebraska college of agriculture on June 15.

Receiving a copy of the completed program for the day's activities, the farm bureau this week called attention to the discussion of D. L. Gross, extension agronomist, on the legislation. In addition the agronomist will tell about the hybrid corn law which seeks to protect the buyers of hybrid seed.

Dr. F. D. Keim, chairman of the agronomy department at the college, is scheduled to tell about progress in bindweed experimental work. New and so-called new crops including artichokes, soybeans, atlas sorgo, hemp and broom grass will all be discussed by Dr. T. A. Kiesselbach.

### Sketch of Life of John Kopia, Old Resident

Former Resident of This City Dies at Des Moines Home and Is Laid to Rest in That City.
