Take Much of Board's Time

May Meetings of Commissioners are Devoid of Highlights—Name Teft as County Judge.

At May meetings of Cass County Commissioners, C. E. Teft, of Weeping Water was appointed as Special County Judge, during the present term of the County Judge A. H. Duxbury, ending January 9, 1941, to act as Judge of the County Court of Cass county in any action or proceeding in which the elected County Judge may be disqualified, or during his absence temporarily from the county, or when he may be temporarily disabled by sickness or otherwise. Official bond of Mr. Teft as Special County Judge was also approved, allowing him to serve in such capacity during the absence of Judge Duxbury in Washington the past few weeks.

The Board also approved orders by County Judge renewing Mother's Pension of Mrs. Maggie Herrington, and revoking the Mothers' Pensions of Elizabeth Wright and Janet Irene Simmons.

At its session on May 6 the Board disapproved the application of Oscar J. Butt of South Bend for an "On and Off" Sale license for the sale of beer at Lake Park in South Bend precinct.
