### BIBLE SCHOOL OPENS WITH 46 ENROLLED

Forty-six children are enrolled in the inter-denominational Bible school at the Presbyterian church. The school opened Monday morning. A staff of three instructors and six helpers are in charge. Miss Eleanor Minor is superintendent of the junior and Bible school department, Mrs. Wiley Sigler is superintendent of the primary department and Margaret Bauer of the kindergarten. Jenn Knorr is pianist and Eleanor Giles, enrollment chairman, Harriet Goss, Norma and Gloria Johnson, and Frances Clodt are also helpers.

As the theme of the program, the leaders have chosen "Follow Me." The classes are divided into three sections. The junior department includes children from the ages of 9 to 12; the primary department, 7 and 8 years of age; and the kindergarten, below 7.

The schedule followed by the primary and junior departments opens at nine o'clock with opening exercises. At 9:30 Bible study is held. 10 o'clock brings a hand work period and recreation or drama is held from 10:30 to 11. At eleven the children go upstairs for church service. A half-hour service is held just as regular church. Ushers seat the children.

Dr. H. G. McClusky led the church service Monday. Rev. G. A. Pahl conducted the worship today. Rev. J. W. Tenzler is in charge on Wednesday; Miss Estelle Baird, on Thursday; and Dr. McClusky on Friday.

The kindergarten school opens with a song and prayer service. A Bible story is followed by a dramatization then a nature story. Handwork precedes period of outdoor recreation. Next on the program is a rest and lunch period. A period of study follows then song period and dismissal.

Children in the kindergarten are studying the seeds and their growth today. They planted seeds in eggshells. In the primary department the children follow the story "Jesus is a Shepherd." A nature study is held to show that "God cares." The junior girls are sewing and the boys drawing in crayon.

Much of the credit for the session this summer goes to Miss Eleanor Minor and her mother, Mrs. L. O. Minor, who organized the classes and secured teachers. The final exhibit of work and Bible study will be held Sunday, June 20.
