

Crops of the State Benefited by Sunday Rains

General Rains Add to Subsoil Moisture and Will Place Corn Safe for Rest of Heated Term.

General rains that reached torrential intensity gave increased encouragement to Nebraska farmers despite some damage to crops by wind, hail and rain.

The storm struck late Sunday afternoon with precipitation of 2.38 at Burwell, 2.20 at Ashland, 1.93 at Omaha and lesser amounts in all parts of the state.

Storm damage was heaviest at Omaha where sewers were damaged, properties flooded and paving ripped up.

Hail was reported to have stripped corn in a small belt beginning at Shelton and extending to Lawrence and Ayr.

Corn in silks which might be attacked by grasshoppers will have a better chance, it was indicated.

Anderson said that corn damaged by rain would probably rise again but that suffering from hail would not be helped.

Replevin of Records Sought by Norris

Justice William E. Norris of Eagle Asks That Record Taken From Court Be Restored.

Wm. E. Norris, justice of the peace of Tipton precinct, through his attorney, Rolla VanKirk of Lincoln, filed an undertaking in replevin in the county court Monday afternoon.

The justice seeks to have restored to him one No. 2 docket with sheets, 500 justice files and jackets and loose correspondence.

The action is directed against Sheriff Homer Sylvester and Clerk of the District Court C. E. Ledgway.

The petition of the plaintiff states that he is the duly elected and qualified justice of the peace and entitled to the files and records of his office.

County Attorney J. A. Capwell, who at the direction of the office of the attorney general filed charges against Mr. Norris of malfeasance in office and extortion, is offering a motion to quash the undertaking on behalf of Sheriff Sylvester.

The motion to quash alleges that the records and files were taken by the sheriff under the two warrants issued on the charges filed by the county attorney, that they are evidence in the case and not a proper object for replevin.

CMTC Boys Shooting on the Local Range

Members of the Provisional Training Regiment Hiked to This City Monday to Start Training

The young men of the Citizen's Military Training Corps were hiked Monday from Fort Crook, their training station to the government rifle range north of this city.

The citizen soldiers will be given a firing course on the range with rifle and machine guns, one of the climaxes of the month of training.

The students have been undergoing a thorough course of drilling and schooling at the fort as the basic part of their training in the military tactics and now will have the actual shooting course to complete their month of duty.

The members of the regiment were equipped with their packs and rifles for the hike from the fort and found a real taste of the life of a soldier seeing the world on foot.

They will remain at the range over Wednesday for the shooting course and will then return to the fort for the final week of the camp.

The CMTC makes the fort a very lively place as the young soldiers have many admiring visitors from their home communities to help brighten up the four weeks of training with sporting and social events adding to the liveliness of the post life.
