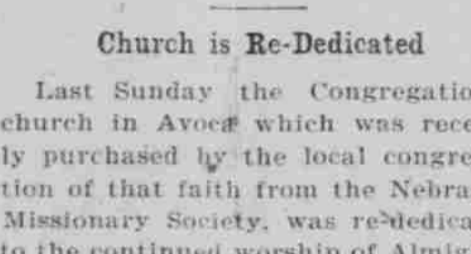
Church is Re-Dedicated

AT THE LITTLE BRICK SCHOOL

This particular school is situated now about a mile and a half west of Mynard, and in the winter of 1869-1870 was taught by Charles D. Handy, although but few now would remember the school days of the lads and lasses who then attended this particular country school. But Charles I. Long of Murdock, son of Abraham Long, one of the scholars in that school, found among his papers three reports issued to Abraham Long, father, Silas Long, uncle and Willie Long, another uncle of Charles which showed the studies and percent of these three lads, near seventy years ago. Abraham and Willie Long have long since passed and Silas Long is now past 85 years of age, and makes his home at Ve-Ro Beach, Florida. Mr. Charles I. Long was kind enough to furnish us a copy of the reports of these school boys, which follow. Many people in Cass county will remember them. This school is known as district No. 45:

Abraham Long, report for the winter term, 1869-1870: Reading, 89; spelling, 92; writing, 80; arithmetic, 87; Grammar, 89; average scholarship, 83; attendance, 94; deportment, 94; average standing, 91—Chas. D. Handy, teacher.

Silas Long, report for the winter term, 1869-1870: Reading, 78; spelling, 86; writing, 80; arithmetic, 89; grammar, 88; average scholarship, 84; attendance, 90; deportment, 88; average standing, 87.—Chas. D. Handy, teacher.

Willie Long, report for the winter term, 1869-1870: Reading, 88; spelling, 85; average scholarship, 87; attendance, 86; deportment, 70; average standing 81.—Chas. D. Handy, teacher.
