### Tax Advertising Campaign Getting Splendid Results

It takes a long time to build and pay for a home, but a short time to lose it if your taxes are not paid.

Legislative bill No. 1 that enables taxpayers to meet their delinquent tax obligations to their government with interest and penalties ignored (up to March 19, 1937, when the debt began drawing interest anew to the date payment is made) means a saving of approximately 7% per annum on back taxes—more than is being paid on most any form of investment today. This is probably one of the most popular bills for the average citizen of the many that were passed by the first unicameral legislature.

The series of advertisements being published in the Journal, instructing people as to their rights under the new law, bears the endorsement of the Cass county commissioners, the County Treasurer and Plattsburgh city officials. These ads have already created much interest among residents of Cass county who owe delinquent taxes and have resulted in the payment of considerable of the delinquent taxes due.

While a few of the big delinquent tax amounts have been erased from the treasurer's books, together with many of the smaller accounts, there are still a good number of people who are not in position to pay immediately, but who have made inquiry concerning the amount and will speed the day of payment as rapidly as possible now that they know the amount is again drawing interest from March 19 when the law became effective canceling back interest and penalties then due. That is why it is important to make payment as quickly as possible and cut off this new interest.

It has been said everyone complains about the taxes they have to pay, and without doubt taxes are too high. The fact remains that if everyone paid their taxes, taxes as a whole would be lower. The Journal is pleased to bring to its readers the set of seven tax advertisements, fifth of which appears in this issue, and trusts everyone owing back taxes will be able to rake up the money to meet same before the very liberal provisions of this non-interest, non-penalty law are withdrawn.

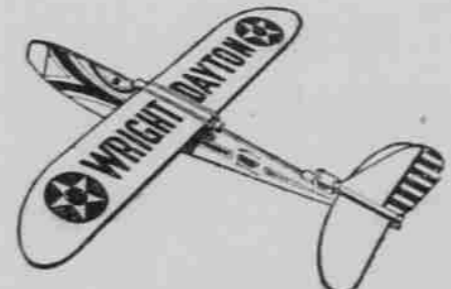
