

Oil Drilling Starting Near Murray Today

Golden Rod Company Expects to Start Sinking of Well on Wm. Sporer Farm Northwest of Murray.

From Wednesday's Daily—The Golden Rod Oil company, composed of a large group of Cass county stockholders, are to start today on the actual operation of their well sinking on the William Sporer farm northwest of Murray.

The rig has been on the grounds for some time and today A. M. Scroggin of Wichita, Kansas, secured the last parts of the drilling machinery and had them installed this afternoon to start the work on the well.

The piping and other material is on the grounds and the work will be pushed as rapidly as possible to determine the possibilities of oil in the location which has been selected as being the most favorable for the well. Scientists and others who have investigated the locality have found many encouraging signs of oil possibilities and much oil in wells nearby have led to the determination to sink the well.

The success of the well boring will mean a great deal to Cass county and this section of Nebraska and if paying quantities of oil are found it will prove a great boom to the state.

E. A. Nutzman of Nebawka, is president of the company, and the stockholders are some of the leading farmers of that section of the county and many in this city and vicinity have become interested in the company. Among those in the community where the well is being sunk, who are stockholders are John Urish, W. G. Boedeker of Murray, Otto Schafer, Fred Kahler and Adam Schafer.
