

SCHOOL CHILDREN ACCIDENTS

LINCOLN, Oct. 26 (UP)—Twenty-four Nebraska school children lost their lives in accidents during the first month of school, Charles W. Taylor, state superintendent of public instruction said today in urging a class room safety campaign.

Six of the deaths were drownings, two children were run down by cars, two were killed at railroad crossings, three were burned to death in home fires, two were killed in automobile collisions, one was thrown from a car and killed and three were killed by horses. Other deaths came from a variety of causes.
