Thirty-Five Fires in City in Past Year

Fire Chief Sandin Gives Resume of Work—Loss on Buildings \$14,785, Contents \$8,910.

Dr. O. Sandin, chief of the Plattsmouth fire department has compiled the result of the activities of his department for the year 1937 and which shows that thirty-five fires occurred in the city in that space of time.
 Six fires were of unknown origin, three overheated stoves, two smoke damage, two matches, one incendiary, eight from chimney and roof, two cigarettes, three rubbish, two burning weeds, two from stovepipes in partition, four automobile fires.
 The value of the buildings involved in the fires was \$56,150 and the contents at \$52,850, the insurance carried on the buildings was \$32,850 and on contents \$17,500. The loss on buildings is set at \$14,785 and on the contents at \$8,910.
 The department has had an excellent record and their efficient work has saved a great deal of loss to the community as the volunteer firemen are prompt in responding to their calls and do their utmost to save loss in damage to the residents of the community.
